OTTAWA — Queen's MP Hon. J. Angus MacLean returned to Ottawa this week following visits to New Zealand and Australia. Mr. MacLean was one of seven federal representatives at the 11th annual meeting of the Commonwealth Parliamentary Association.

Prince Edward Island was represented by Hon. J. David Stewart.

Mr. MacLean said the meetings were informative and worthwhile in terms of exchanging views on world and Commonwealth subjects. His own chief contribution came during a discussion of the world population explosion when he spoke at some length on the dangers of a world food shortage.

**MASTER KEYS FOR CARS SAID EASILY AVAILABLE**

MONTREAL (CP)—If you are the most careful car owner in Canada and believe in the security of lock and key, think again, because you don't really stand a chance against today's car thief and the 15 or so keys he carries in his pocket.

E. H. S. Piper, general manager of the All Canada Insurance Federation said in an interview here.

"For \$15 any car thief can equip himself with a small set of master keys which will open most cars on the road—and he can possess the keys quite legally."

Mr. Piper said that recently a company in Oshawa, Ont., has been advertising these keys as a "boon to garage owners."

There is nothing illegal about the manufacture of duplicate or master keys in Canada or the United States, Mr. Piper said.

"In France, on the other hand, it is illegal to manufacture a duplicate key for a car. If you lose your key you must go to the dealer who bought the car from and establish various proofs before you can get another key."

"In Canada, if you come along and find a man with a key in your car and about to open it, he can say he has made some sort of a mistake. The fact that the key in his hand is a duplicate of yours doesn't prove him guilty of anything. It's very very difficult to prove intent."
