SUMMERSIDE — Sandy's Royals of Charlottetown bombed Borden Legion Nationals, 8-4, in an Island Intermediate Hockey League fixture played at Civic Stadium here before 403 fans last night.

The combined efforts of Donnie Frizzell in the Roy's cage and the double goal performances of Gordie Whitlock, Alfie Flanagan, and Dave Lawlor, turned the trick, and gave Royals undisputed possession of first place.

The Royals opened against Summerside's Pope Motor Aces last Friday with a 12-3 victory, while Borden Legion were trimming the locals in the league opener, 8-4.

The visitors built up a 3-0 first period margin, and before the second canto was over, they had increased it to 5-0. The Royals added three more in the third.

Darryl Doyle nipped one goal and assisted on three, and Angie Carroll dented the twines on a single occasion.

Goalie Frizzell protected his shut-out as the Borden squad made vain efforts to break the shutout. Elton Ellis, Borden leader in their opener, faltered somewhat last night, but did manage to spearhead a determined Nationals' drive late in the second period.

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Rangers Blank Hawks 5-0; Montreal Loses To Leafs

CHICAGO (CP) — Reggie Fleming scored a pair of goals for the second consecutive game Wednesday night as New York Rangers hammered the Chicago Black Hawks 5-0 in a National Hockey League game.

The Rangers, who now have won four in a row and the last two by 5-0 scores, now are tied with Toronto Maple Leafs, just one point back of the league-leading Hawks.

Oriand Kurtenbach, Boom Boom Geoffrion and Don Marshall also scored for New York, which is staging its best early-season form in years. Last season the club finished in the league cellar.

The Rangers, who have lost only once in their last 10 games, also got another strong non-scoring performance from Ed Giacomin. He stopped 22 shots for his second consecutive shut-out and third of the season, tops in the league.

Fleming, a former Hawk and the league's most penalized player, ran his goal output to nine—just two shy of Stan Mikita's league-leading total.

KURT GETS WINNER Kurtenbach got the hustling Rangers rolling with a power-play goal in the first period while Matt Ravlich of Chicago was in the penalty box for roughing Kurtenbach out a game.

From Geoffrion moved around a Chicago defenseman Pat Stapleton and drove a 20-footer behind Hawk netminder Glenn Hall.

Geoffrion added to the Rangers' margin in the first with his fourth goal of the season from a scramble.

Marshall got a loose puck behind the Chicago goal and tucked it behind Hall from the side of the net to get the Rangers going in the first minute of the third after a scoreless second period.

Fleming wrecked whatever faint hopes the Hawks might have had for a rally with two goals at 3:13 and 15:34.

The victory was Toronto's seventh while Montreal took its eighth defeat. Toronto has 21 points, Montreal has 18.

Wills Is Key To Major L. Trades

Pittsburgh, Wills remained the centre of most of the conjecture as the hinge on which future deals might swing.

Here's the way the situation appeared to be taking shape: —The Dodgers, who strangely named their infield by sending two-time batting champion Tommy Davis to New York Mets for second baseman Ron Hunt in the first major trade-of the meetings, still were trying to unload Wills.

—The Yankees, having opened their trade bag and shipped third baseman Cleve Boyer to Atlanta Braves for outfielder Bill Robinson in the first inter-league trade of the meetings, still were pursuing Wills to fill the hole on the left side of their infield.

—The Yankees were talking to a number of other clubs, including the world-champion Baltimore Orioles, Cleveland Indians and Chicago White Sox, who might have the commodity needed to pass on to the Dodgers in exchange for Wills.

How the trade eventually was going to materialize remained questionable, but there was little doubt that both the Yankees and Dodgers were trying to get Wills on the road to New York.

The Yankees have marketable material they would part with including outfielder Roger Maris and either one of two pitchers Jim Bouton or Al Downing.

Both the Indians, who are disenchanted with Rocky Colavito and supposedly ready to trade him, and the White Sox might be receptive to a slinger of the Maris mold.

The Orioles, on the other hand, admittedly are looking for an experienced major league pitcher, a category in which Bouton and Downing fall.

Whether one of the three teams or someone else the Yankees can deal with — has the shortstop help the Dodgers want isn't known. But it may be soon.

Summerside Minor Hockey Is Underway

SUMMERSIDE — The town's Minor Hockey League coaching staff was announced yesterday at a meeting called by minor hockey program chairman Bob Schurman and minor hockey director Benny Grady.

On the staff are Uric Gallant and Grant Grady, both former directors of minor hockey here, Hank Landry who has been with the coaching staff for a number of years, and Ron Hudson, in his second year of coaching minor hockey. Robert Perry returns this year as equipment manager.

The program began November 19 with registration at all schools totalling 475 now and expected to reach 500, approximately the same total as last year. The program covers ages from six years in the Mosquito bracket to the Juveniles, up to 18 years old. The juveniles are once again sponsored by the Kinmen, who have undertaken their sponsorship for several years now.

Chairman Schurman and director Grady have already met with the Summerside Minor Hockey Booster's Club, whose chairman is Jim MacLean, and expressed their appreciation for the club's support. The booster's club was organized last year, though many of its members have been a fixture for many years in the Annual Night, Mass. versus Summerside Pee Wee hockey game. The club provides coaching when needed, transportation for the teams, and sponsors the Nettic series each year. The club hopes to recruit more members, and any interested persons are asked to contact Jim MacLean, Gordon Kelly or Sid Forbes.

The emphasis in the minor hockey program is to be on participation and fun for the kids involved, not winning as an end in itself.

Cost of the minor hockey program is about \$6,000 to \$7,000 per year, with new equipment being purchased this year including new nets and goal-keeping equipment. Ice time for the minor leagues will total about 21 or 22 hours a week.

Benny Grady noted that many children still have not registered with the program though they would like to, and advised parents with kids in this situation to bring them in the stadium.

The minor hockey program is under the auspices of the Summerside Recreation Commission, which is a body set up at the request of the town with representatives from the town council, school board and service clubs.

Chairman of the commission is Layton Schurman.
