LARGELY ATTENDED CONVENTION OF PROVINCIAL WOMEN'S INSTITUTES

Fine weather greeted the delegates attending the forty-first annual convention of the Prince Edward Island Women's Institutes yesterday. The convention, which will continue today is largely attended and is being held at Prince of Wales College Hall.

formation headquarters will be replaced by a new type to be known as militia group headquarters. Under the previous organization, formation headquarters were responsible for specific types of units and in many instances, due to distances involved, could not be responsible for all units of their formation.

ARMORED CORPS Transfer of the anti-tank defence role from the artillery to the armored corps requires eight more armored regiments. These new armored regiments will be provided by conversion of two artillery, two infantry, two reconnaissance and two armored car regiments.

ARTILLERY Since anti-tank defence has been taken over by the armored corps, anti-tank regiments are no longer required in the artillery. There are also too many anti-aircraft regiments in the existing organization and it is planned to convert as many as possible of these to other types of artillery and to replace the remainder by units of other corps.

ENGINEERS Because field park squadrons are no longer included in the organization of field engineer regiments in the regular forces, they will not be included in the militia and where possible will be converted to field squadrons. In localities where the strength of the present regiment does not warrant a regimental organization it will be replaced by a field squadron.

SIGNALS CORPS Two regiments are to be amalgamated to form a single regiment. One regiment is being reduced to squadron basis and one squadron is to be disbanded.

INFANTRY CORPS The militia now contains more infantry regiments than required. To provide a more balanced structure nine infantry regiments will be amalgamated with other infantry regiments; one infantry regiment will be absorbed by an armored regiment; one infantry regiment will be disbanded; and two infantry regiments will be converted to armored regiments.

ARMY SERVICE CORPS This corps is being reorganized to form units of varying size determined by the recruiting potential in the locality. The new units will not be field units but designed to train personnel found in the corps and from which field units could be formed when required.

ORDNANCE CORPS The existing ordnance unit at Halifax is to be redesignated as an ordnance company.

REORGANIZATION OF THE MILITIA The reorganization of the militia is being carried out in a number of stages. The first stage is the conversion of the militia into a militia organization.

ARMY MEDICAL CORPS The corps is to be reorganized along the same lines as the Army Service Corps and for the same reason.

ORDNANCE CORPS The corps will be reorganized along the same lines as the Army Service and Medical Corps.

EASTERN COMMAND FORMATION HEADQUARTERS Formation headquarters at Charlottetown, Halifax and Saint John, N. B., will be replaced by militia group headquarters. In addition militia group headquarters will be formed and located at St. John's, Nfld., Sydney, N. S., and Moncton.
