Notes and Comments.

—On Thursday last, the legislature of Nova Scotia voted down by a majority of four the bill to extend the provincial electoral franchise to widows and spinners now qualified to vote under the municipal franchise.

—The Montreal Gazette remarks that the Liberals in Parliament should send a copy of Mr. Mercier's farewell message and a sheet of clean paper to Sir Richard Cartwright. They had more than one Joush on their ship.

—Brome is a border county, and a farming country, and Sir Richard Cartwright never spoke in it. Still Mr. Fisher was afraid to tackle it. Verily, as the Montreal Gazette remarks, these be dark hours for the look-to-Washington policy.

—The German Kaiser's threat to pulverize Russia had a certain punning force in German, which it loses in English. In German "pulver" (from the Latin of pulvis) means "gunpowder," so that the Emperor's menace had a military significance, and implied the use of arms of precision rather than of a pebble and mortar.

—The St. John Sun publishes figures from the blue books, which show that New Brunswick has been going into debt at the average rate of about \$150,000 a year, while it has been drawing on capital at Ottawa. The admitted increase of debt last year was \$216,000, but the actual increase must have been in the neighborhood of \$250,000.

—The following verses are said to have been greatly admired by Princess May, recently bereaved of her royal lover:

Let nothing make thee sad or fretful,
 Or too regretful;
 He still,
 What God hath ordered must be right;
 Then find in thine own delight,
 My will!

Why shouldst thou fill to-day with sorrow
 About to-morrow,
 My heart?

One watches all with care most true;
 Doubt not that He will give thee, too,
 Thy part.

Only be steadfast; never waver,
 Nor seek earth's favor,
 But rest.

Thou knowest what God's will must be
 For all his creatures, so for thee,
 The best.

—If the Emperor William desires to be regarded as the head of the German race he will have to use more judgment in his utterances. The German press of the dual monarchy, which has not the fear of suspension before its eyes, has been outspoken in its reprimands. One Vienna organ of German opinion thinks that his last despot speech should have been left unspoken, and another says that he invited the depopulation of Germany when he counselled the dissatisfied to leave the country.

For it is urged, there is not a doubt not contain a discontented element. The tone of the Kaiser's remarks, especially where he spoke of Providence as "our ally," thus putting himself on a par with the Almighty, is pronounced irreverent and out of harmony with his claims to be regarded as a pious sovereign. The general verdict is that the Emperor sacrifices his dignity and betrays the weakness of his character—his extraordinary vanity and willfulness—especially when he goes about making ill-considered speeches.

—The Montreal Gazette's Ottawa correspondent reports that "several of the Maritime Province members, and especially those of the Prince Edward Islands, are not inclined to regard very favorably a number of clauses in Hon. Mr. Tupper's bill to amend the Fisheries Act, which deal with the subject of the lobster fisheries. The bill contemplates the imposition of a fee of \$50 per packer and a cent for labelling each case, which would amount on the average to a thousand cases, or a total tax of \$60 per annum on each factory. Messrs. MacDonald and McLean state that these are restrictions which are totally unnecessary, and they hope to get the Minister of Marine and Fisheries to effect considerable modifications in the matter. They think that the present close season of thirty-five days is all that is required to build up the business. They also say that the clause in the present law preventing the taking of lobsters under 9½ inches in length is abortive in its effects, and it has been found impossible to carry it out. There is ample testimony to show that the short close season is the cause of the improvement in the fishery, and is sufficient to keep it from being wiped out."

Lord Lansdowne intends to leave India in December, when he will have completed four years in the office of viceroy.

The notion that character can be discovered in penmanship gets a rather severe setback by an experiment conducted by the New York World. The World readers were permitted to guess the name of the writer of a sentence published in fac-simile in that paper, and they hit upon about all the eminent men in the country. It turns out to have been written by Carlyle Harris, the condemned murderer now in the New York Tombs.

Railway Meeting at Uigg.

As previously announced, a meeting was held in the Uigg Hall to discuss the best steps to be taken to obtain the much needed accommodation of a branch railway through Belfast and Murray Harbor. After the matter had been ventilated by able speeches from several of those present, the following resolution was submitted and passed:

Whereas, in view of the proposed tunnel across the Northumberland Straits becoming an accomplished fact, we would be precluded from deriving any benefit that would result therefrom for want of a branch railway through this section of the Province, known as Belfast and Murray Harbor, which comprises, in area and population, about one-fifth of the Province.

And Whereas, the Federal Government derives a tangible benefit from the union of this Province with the Dominion, in that the revenue derived from the Province exceeds the expenditure by a considerable amount.

And Whereas, the Dominion Government in violation of the B. N. A. Act relating to railways and branch railways not of international importance, has built or subsidized such a railway.

And Whereas, by a return laid on the table of the Dominion House of Commons at its last session, it is shown that this Province is discriminated against, inasmuch as, whilst \$3,615,491 were given as subsidies since Confederation, this Province received only \$96,000, and of 425½ miles subsidized only 12 were built in this Province, being only about one-tenth of the money and number of miles this Province is entitled to, according to population.

Therefore Resolved, That a statement of the facts be laid before the Dominion Government by petition, praying for the construction of this road or the granting of the usual subsidies.

Also moved and carried that the next meeting be held in Glen William on Saturday, the 19th March, inst., at 6 o'clock, p. m. Representatives and all interested invited to attend.

Sir Charles Tupper Speaks.

At the dinner of the Association of the Chambers of Commerce, held in London on the 9th inst., Sir Charles Tupper made the speech of the occasion concerning "Canada and her commercial resources." The English manufacturers and exporters, he said, were smarting under the hardship of the McKinley tariff, and it would not be long before the people would show their loyalty to the integrity of the British empire by striking the United States a vital blow in return. Canada was in favor of uniting her interests as closely as possible with those of the mother country. She knew she had a granary with capacity sufficient to supply England's needs. She could, in fact, send to England all the wheat and flour which the latter needed for her great army of factory laborers. In exchange, Canada could take manufactured articles of the mother country. Above all things Canada wanted Englishmen from England to immigrate to her shore, and with their muscle and capital work her vast undeveloped resources. By her present policy Canada prevented Boston and New York from becoming her commercial capitals, and with the aid of the home government she could still further encroach upon the prestige of these cities, and make one of her seaports the greatest outlet in the world for grain. Canada had soil and willingness to accomplish these results, and the time was ripe when she should receive the opportunity to show the capabilities of her territory and people. Sir Charles was interrupted frequently by applause during his address.

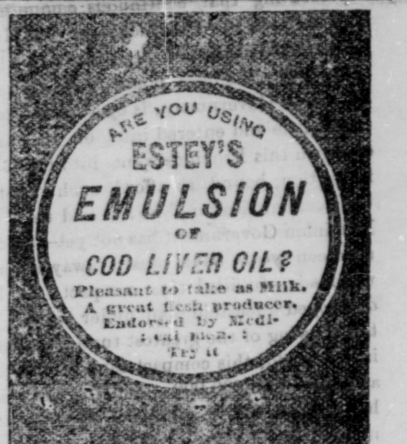
