IN THE HOUSE OF COMMONS

The Facetious Minister of Public Works.

THE ADDRESSES WILL OCCUPY HOUSE TILL EASTER.

A Liberal Who is Satisfied About Prohibition.

OTTAWA, March 28.—The debate on the address was continued by Davies (Saskatchewan) who made a vulgar attack on Davin which led to a wordy warfare between the two members, necessitating the interference of the speaker.

After speeches by Messrs Roche (Marquette) and Sprout, East Grey, McClure (Liberal) Clchester, spoke.

He claimed the Government had broken no prohibition pledges, hence he had no fault to find with them.

It appears that while Davin was speaking on Friday the Minister of Public Works interjected a remark about a scandal.

The relevancy of the observation is not apparent, but Tarte thought the sentence so vital that he went to the Hansard reporter and asked him to be sure and insert it in the report. Davin, not having heard Tarte use the expression, took occasion to call attention to the matter.

Yesterday the Minister of Public Works wriggled out of his difficulty by stating that he had not applied the obnoxious epithet to any one in the House, but the fact of his going to Hansard to secure the insertion of the phrase showed he had some design in his mind.

It is generally conceded that the address cannot be disposed of before the Easter holidays. Fully 25 conservative members have signified their desire to speak. The petition asking Parliament to grant an extra 25 cents per day to the Militia force has been ruled out, it being contrary to the rules of parliament to receive any petition asking for money grants.

Sir Louie Davies has been ill for the past few days but is better and was able to be in the House yesterday.

OTTAWA, March 28.—The postmaster-ship of Montreal is not to be filled until after the session. This is an indication that the job will go to Beauvolet, M. P. Jimmy McShane will be pleased by the support of the French Canadians in his candidature for the Mayoralty of Montreal and it is whispered he will not be overlooked when the contracts for the Montreal harbor works are given out.

HEAVY FIGHTING GOING ON

Aguinaldo's Troops are Retreating

BUT ARE MAKING A DOGGED FIGHT

American Troops Have Pushed on in Pursuit.

WASHINGTON, March 28.—The third day of the fighting north of Manila has brought little news of a decisive character from which the war department officials could judge what the final outcome of this movement would be.

In all official quarters the most intense interest prevailed, but there was no excitement and none of that anxiety and tension shown during the memorable days of last summer, when decisive blows were being struck at Santiago.

Early in the day General Otis cabled the War Department a brief but comprehensive dispatch. It disclosed that severe fighting was going on, with the forces advanced as far as Mariolow, while the insurgen's under the command of Aguinaldo were being driven backwards with great slaughter. This and the press despatches satisfied the officials that the strategic movement of entrapping the insurgents had not proved as successful as was designed, and that the move had now shifted to a retreat by Aguinaldo's forces and pursuit by our troops.

The insurgents' retreat toward Malolos was slow and dogged and advantage was taken of one after another of the lines of entrenchment, the burning of bridges and the interruption of communications.

That the fighting would proceed into the fourth day was shown by his closing sentence. This column will press on in the morning. This refers to Tuesday.

ESTEEMED EXCHANGES.

The Montreal Gazette remarks: There were a number of compliments paid to Sir Charles Tupper on the conclusion of his speech on the address in the House of Commons. The greatest, however, was Sir Wilfrid Laurier's. The Premier asked the House to be adjourned for a day that he might have time to prepare an answer to the indictment of the Conservative leader.

RACE WAR.

Exterminating the Negroes in Little River County, Arkansas.

TEXARKANA, Ark., March 27.—Race war is on in Little River County and during the last 48 hours an indefinite number of negroes have met their death, at the hands of the white population. Seven are known to have been lynched and the work is not done yet. The bodies of the victims of the mob's vengeance are hanging to the limbs of trees in various parts of the county. The country is in a state of most intense excitement. Little River county is in the extreme southwest corner of the state, being bordered on the west by the Indian Territory and on the south by Texas. The negro population is large and has for a long time proved very troublesome. Frequent murders have occurred and thefts and fights have become common affairs, but it was not until Tuesday that the trouble assumed a serious aspect. It then developed that carefully laid plans had been made by a number of negroes to precipitate a race war and that many white men had been marked for victims. It is learned that 23 negroes were implicated in this plot, and the whites are now bent on meting out summary punishment to the entire coterie of conspirators. Seven have been killed and the work of wiping out the entire list continues without relaxation. Wherever one is found he is quickly strung up and his body perforated with bullets.

SLUSH!

SIR,—The writer would like to call attention to the disgraceful condition of the sidewalks throughout the city. In many places it is impossible for ladies or children to get along without getting wet feet. On Grafton street, near Coffin's corner, the slush is several inches deep, and in several places on Kent street it is even worse,—one very bad place is opposite a double-dwelling house, bearing the numbers 388 and 386. At these places the sidewalk is simply a deep gutter. If there is a law governing this matter why is it not enforced? And if there is no law and public decency will not compel these people to keep their sidewalks clean, why not have the city employes do it? If the city is going to do it, it is quite certain that sufficient men must be employed, as certainly one man, dressed in good clothes, looking on at two men trying to shovel slush, is not going to improve the streets very much.
