MONTREAL (CP) — The Mont-
real and Canadian stock ex-
changes closed with outstanding
improvements Thursday despite
the lull on Wall Street. Closed for
the American Independence Day
holiday.

Trans-Mountain held a 5 1/2-in-
crease at 112 and Inter-Provincial
Pipe Lines firm at 57 1/2.
Among the refining oils, Imperial
moved up 1/4 to 58 and McColl
added point at 81 while Canadian
Oil was down 1/2 to 38 1/2. In
pulp and papers, St. Lawrence
Corporation firm at 15 1/2 while
International Paper dropped
1 1/2 to 9 1/2.

Ontario steel was low in its
division, losing 1/2 at 23 while Al-
gonia gained 1/2 at 38 1/2 and Do-
minion Steel was up 1/2 to 28 1/2.
Among base metals, Interna-
tional Nickel firm at 90 1/2 and
Asbestos at 31 was up 1/4 while
Aluminium eased an equal frac-
tion at 47 1/2. Banks were up in
minor fractions.

Mines and oils were generally
burnt Hill at 60 each gained 10
cents while Eastern Mining at
2.75, Alsop at 50 and Arcadia at
1.75 each added five cents.

Central Del Rio was up 1/2 to 12 1/2
and Calgary-Edmonton lost 1/2 at
33 1/2. Provo was down 20 cents to
3.30 while Canadian Atlantic at
8.75 and Canadian Devonian at
8.20 each slipped 15 cents.

REVISION OF TELEGRAPH RATE STRUCTURE IN CANADA

Canadian National Telegraphs and Canadian Pacific Communications have applied
to the Board of Transport Commissioners for Canada for authority to revise completely
the tariff of rates under which charges are made for the transmission of telegraph
messages within Canada. The present basis of telegraph charges has been in effect
since before the turn of the century, and contains numerous inequities and anomalies.
It is now proposed to introduce a more modern system, similar to that in use in the
United States, whereunder the charges for the transmission of messages between any
two points in Canada will be based entirely on the direct air line mileage between
such points. In the result there will, of course, be a number of increases and decreases
in the charges payable under the tariff of rates presently in effect.

With the introduction of these new message rates, it is also proposed to discontinue
the practice of making additional charges where messages are interchanged between
telegraph companies, or where delivery of telegrams by telephone is effected at
points where no telegraph facilities exist. It is also proposed to reduce the existing
telegraph money transfer tolls within Canada.
The Board of Transport Commissioners has directed that a schedule of the proposed
new rates be made available for public inspection at all Canadian National and Canadian
Pacific telegraph offices. These schedules are now available for perusal. The Board has
set Tuesday, August 13, 1957, as the date for the formal hearing of the application of
the telegraph companies, and has directed that the public be notified by means of this
advertisement that representations in respect of the proposed new rates must be for-
warded to the Secretary, Board of Transport Commissioners for Canada, Ottawa,
Ontario, not later than Tuesday, August 6, 1957.
