**Eagles Capture Top Spot
Minor Playoffs Coming Up**

By defeating Vernon River last Sunday, the Georgetown Eagles assured themselves of first place in the Kings County Baseball League. They have one game left, and losing it still wouldn't make any difference. The battle for second place will continue between Mt. Stewart and Morell, with the latter one-half game behind at present, with a game in hand. The Peakes are practically assured of fourth place.

The last two playoff spots are still up for grabs. Cardigan and Vernon River hold the two positions at present, but Souris is only one victory behind both teams, so it could be a dog eat dog battle yet. Postponed games will make up the balance of the schedule, which was supposed to have ended last Sunday. A full slate scheduled for July 5th will probably be this coming Sunday's schedule. Here is a recap:

Peakes Bombers J. MacAulay (11), at Cardigan, Lawrence MacGregor (13) and in the second game, Mt. Stewart, Art Coffin (6) at Cardigan, Bill Cookman (6), Vernon River, Fred Hughes, (14) will go over to Morell. Louis Murphy (42), while in the other game, Souris, Maynard Paquet (15) visit the Georgetown Eagles (see Martell 24). This will still leave four games to be played. Morell at Vernon River, Cardigan at Mt. Stewart, Souris at Morell, Cardigan at Peakes, and Vernon River at Souris. Slight mistake, it's five games.

The Uptowners and Center-towners are having quite a battle for first place in the Souris Town League. They are tied at eight wins and five losses each, and it could boil down to the last game of the schedule, when these two teams meet for their meeting left in the schedule. The Junior group will see Souris Legion meet the Eastern Centennials in a best of three series in Island semifinals. The winner goes against Sumnerdale for the title.

Last Sunday we witnessed the Morell Beavers against the Souris Centennials. It was real easy for Morell. Final score of the slaughter was eighteen to nothing. And not only that, but, Souris was saved from being the victims of a no-noner by the rule-book. In the first inning, the Morell catcher topped the bat of Calvin Creaser, with the batter being awarded first base, and credited with a single. And after that Souris didn't come close to getting a hit off the pitching of Louis Murphy.

In order to finish out the schedule, and maybe play in the playoffs, Souris had to needs help. Only two Souris players are on the team, the rest are originally from Nova Scotia. The players are working in Souris, but, injuries, players going home, or taking other jobs have reduced the team to a bare nine men, and in the fish-cutting business, injuries are quite common. If they would, and they should, apply to the league for permission to take on a couple of players, such permission should be granted.

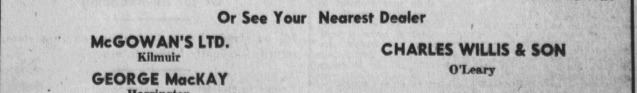
All 18 Swimmers Fail In Lake Ont. Effort

TORONTO (CP)—Charles Grover, 46, of Boston finally gave up his attempt to conquer Lake Ontario Friday. The last of 18 entrants surrendered to exhaustion and cold in the 32-mile Canadian National Exhibition marathon swim. Grover was hauled out of the freezing, choppy lake about 11 miles short of his goal, 21 grunting hours after he had 17 other swimmers had started out from St. Catharines on the lake's southern shore at 6 p.m. Thursday. Like the other swimmers, he came aboard the pitching pilot boat dazed, shivering uncontrollably and suffering from extreme exposure. Grover had gallantly struggled on fighting through four-foot waves and cold in the 32-mile Egyptian Abdul Latif Abou Bay was dragged from the water semi-conscious only four miles from shore. The contestants said it was impossible to conquer the lake in the choppy 51-degree water. "It was too cold. It was too cruel," said Mrs. Heif, as ambulances bore her exhausted husband to hospital.
