stable on the Summerside Police Force. At approximately 3:30 p.m. on the day he had responded to a call to the rear of Holman's store where he found Roy Ford, bleeding from the nose and mouth. He said that he arrested the accused about seven o'clock that evening on First Street in front of Maynard Perry's barber shop. He said that he had seen them together several times that day.

Under cross examination he said that when driving Mr. Ford around to see if he could identify anybody they did not call at the homes of the accused. He said the reason for this was because he knew they would not be home. He testified that they had not been identified by Ford before they were arrested nor had Ford been given a chance to identify them on Tuesday when he was in Town, the day before the preliminary hearing. He (Ford) identified them on Wednesday in the court room where they were under arrest and awaiting trial, but before the hearing commenced.

He said that when searched — **UNUSUAL ACCIDENT** — While on her way to Summerside Wednesday morning with a shipment of young turkey poult to be put aboard the early train, Mrs. Herbert Matthews of Alberton met with an accident just beyond the railway crossing at Portage. Boxes containing the poult were piled in the back part of the car and due to the roughness of the road some of them slipped forward, interfering with the driver's control of the car with the result that it overturned in the ditch. Mrs. Matthews had considerable difficulty in getting out of the car but apart from bruises was not injured. Some of the poult were drowned in water that lay in the ditch but others escaped with a chilling. The car is badly dented but was able to return to Alberton.

Child Killed In Highway Accident

A distressing accident occurred in Knutsford yesterday morning about 9:00 o'clock when Charles Avard Johnston, eight-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest J. Johnston, formerly of Knutsford, near O'Leary, but now living at 323 Myrtle Street, Summerside, was instantly killed by a car driven by Mr. W. E. Brooks of Summerside, formerly of O'Leary. The young lad was on a truck driven by Brenton Smallman and was on his way to the Knutsford school. Mr. Smallman stopped his truck at the home of Mrs. Ralph Ellis, aunt of the little boy, where he was staying, to get his school books. He got out of the truck to cross the road and was hit by Mr. Brooks' car going to Springfield West and was killed instantly.

The accident was investigated by the Alberton detachment of the R.C.M.P. and by Coroner Dr. W. A. Shea of Alberton. An inquest will be held Friday, June 8th at 9:00 P.M. in O'Leary Hall. The following jury was empanelled: Messrs. William Lewis Harris, foreman; Foster Harris, Brenton H. Turner, Charles G. Gay, Knutsford; Wendell S. Turner, John W. Yeo, O'Leary; George Ellis, Springfield West.

possible exception of an occasional car of livestock.

Cost of Service

Mr. Gaffney introduced exhibits showing the cost of the service on the bridge route as being \$34,706 annually while over the Mt. Stewart route for a similar service the cost would be \$64,368. He also produced exhibits showing car loading statements, total express shipments and the amount of less carload freight handled on the Murray Harbour sub division. He stated that the stations from Southport to Village Green contributed only 3.4% of all the L.O.L. traffic.

An exhibit dealing with passenger traffic on the same sub division showed that the six previously mentioned stations provided only 10.6% of the revenue while having 25% of the territory. The total sub division passenger revenue for 1950 was only \$10,646.77. He further stated that the average daily revenue from stations Southport to Village Green was only \$3.60 for passengers, \$2.70 for express and \$1.20 for L.C.L. That total, he added, was less than the daily salary of one man of the train crew.

The \$3.60 daily passenger revenue figure quoted came from an exhibit showing the income from inwards and outwards passengers between the six stations. For 1950 the total number of passengers was 4,635 and the revenue \$1,126.94. "And that," said Mr. Gaffney, "is less than it cost my staff to prepare these statements". Chief Commissioner Archibald adjourned the hearing to 9:30 this morning.
