George Wellington Schurman, of Bedouque, received the degree of Bachelor of Laws. Nineteen others received a similar honor.

SILVER-GRAY FOX.—John Compton, of Bangor, King's County, was fortunate enough the other morning to find a silver-grey fox caught in a trap he had set the evening previous. When found her rymanship was slight and showed fight. She was taken to St. John's and sold for a handsome figure to Mr. Frederick Carlton. Strangled she soon was by an expert in fox killing, and now the skin may be seen at Mr. Carlton's store along with a quantity of other valuable native furs that were secured during the past winter.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

Discussion on the Charges Against Caron.

OTTAWA, April 28.

In the House yesterday, Cartwright resuming the debate on the resolution against Sir Adolphe Caron, said that if the charges were proven the minister was guilty of embezzlement and conspiracy; more than that, he was guilty of one of the greatest scandals that ever a public man could have committed—treason against the Government. He charged the Government with cowardice with their majority in refusing an investigation, and went on to say that the elections for fourteen years were carried by colossal corruption. He was particularly abusive in his language. Cartwright was followed by Dickey, who discussed the question in an able manner and in good temper. He agreed with the Minister of Justice that the House had no right to inquire into the private conduct of any of its members. Dealing with some points advanced by Laurier he said that the House had no right to expel a member unless guilty of felony or a crime and it was most necessary that the House should proceed cautiously in passing resolutions of this character lest it should have to afterwards change its action. As to the charges, there was no doubt but that the Opposition made them as strong as they could be put. Even then it had to be admitted that there were no personal charges against the Postmaster General. If there was it was one of political corruption. Charges 9 and 10 were particularly weak. Put these to a committee and would cover every contractor of the Government who made a subscription for political purposes. All these parties could be summoned and examined in regard to these matters if a resolution of this kind was adopted. You could go back twenty years in a man's life. He then passed on to show that Laurier did all he could to prevent an investigation into the case of Pagan in the Province of Quebec, although he was apparently anxious to investigate the charges here. While opposed to this resolution he would support any investigation made on proper Parliamentary lines. Mr. Edgar reiterated his charges, holding that they were specific and that he could prove on sworn evidence each one of them. Section five was a distinct and specific charge against the Postmaster General of having received money corruptly. Cartwright thought the charges were altogether too vague and not sufficiently specific. He advocated the appointment of a royal commission to investigate the charges. The debate adjourned till Wednesday next.

The intimation THE EXAMINER gave relative to the scope of the redistribution bill as affecting New Brunswick is confirmed. St. John city and county will lose one member, while the counties of Queens and Sanbury will be amalgamated. The question of redistribution in Nova Scotia is still undecided, but whatever change is made will be in the western portion of the province.

As a result of the division on the bitter twine duty, a cordage company has decided to establish a factory at Winnipeg to employ 100 hands. Fifteen railway mail clerks representing all parts of Canada, interviewed Caron and asked for the establishment of an insurance fund in connection with that branch of the service; also, for an increase of salary to maximum of second class clerks. Caron said he would consider the insurance scheme, but thought the request for salaries too late this season.

Mayor Thomas Agala.

HALIFAX, April 28.

Writs have been issued in the Supreme Court this morning, at the instance of Mayor Thomas, of Truro, against all the Liberal members of the House of Assembly of Nova Scotia, and the Sergeant at Arms, and against Detective Power and Jailor Chambers. The plaintiff's claim is for \$50,000 damages, on the plea that the defendants unlawfully assaulted and beat plaintiff and imprisoned him.

Civic Elections in Halifax.

In the civic elections yesterday, Knefe was elected mayor by 160 majority. The new aldermen are W. B. Wallace, P. M. Duggan, A. J. Habley and Geoffrey Morrow.

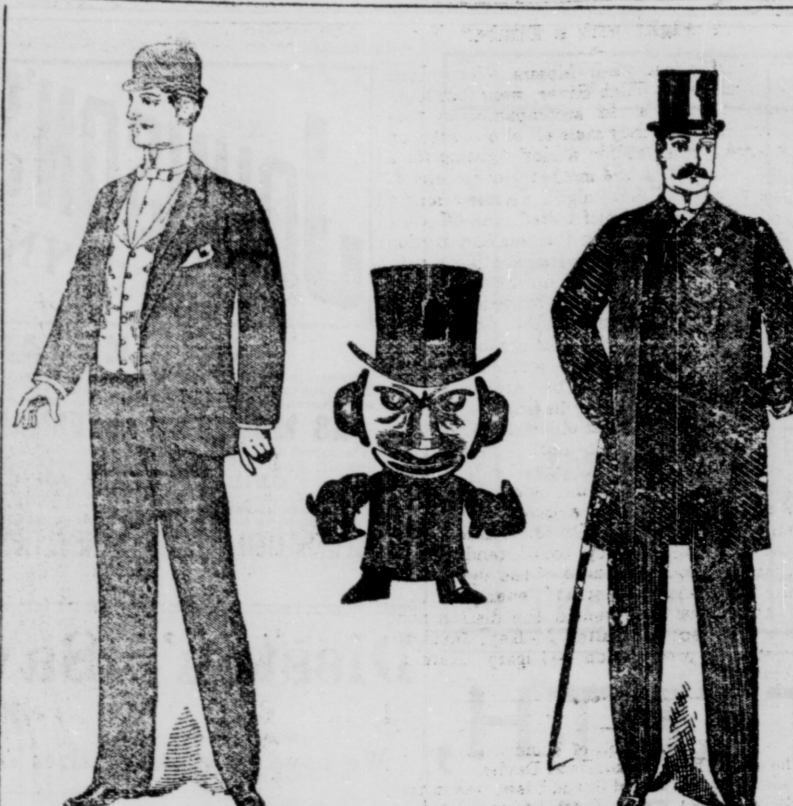
