The Execution of Bennett.

On the morning of the 23rd, Bennett expiated the death of Hon. George Brown. Our despatches say he was quite composed and willing to die. He slept quietly the evening previous to the execution, and was closeted with his priests until the arrival of the sheriff and hangman.

By no words that I can possibly say can I clear myself, and cannot say any more than that I am innocent, as the act was beyond my control. The act by which Hon. George Brown met his death was done in an excited moment. I suppose he could not foresee the consequence. He thought I was going to use the revolver when I drew it from my pocket and he grasped at it and it caused the act which caused his death.
