Canada's Deficit In U. S. Trade At Six-year High

OTTAWA, (CP)—Canada's deficit in United States trade rose to six-year high of \$694,400,000 in the first 10 months of 1953. Exports to the U.S. in the 10 months edged ahead to \$2,035,500,000 from \$1,911,200,000 in the previous year, but imports jumped by more than \$280,000,000 to \$2,729,500,000 from \$2,447,500,000. The unfavorable balance in U.S. trade increased from \$536,300,000 in the 10-month 1952 period, rising to the highest mark since the peak of \$804,500,000 in 1947. Canada balanced off part of this deficit in a surplus in British trade, but the general 10-month interchange showed a Canadian over-all deficit of \$236,500,000. This compares with a surplus of \$248,400,000 in the 10 months of 1952.

Sports Car Race Driver Killed

BUENOS AIRES, (AP) — Eric Forrest Greene, 51, who came out of retirement to drive in Argentina's first international sports car race, died Monday of burns suffered when his car overturned in Sunday's race. Green's Alston-Martin car rolled over and caught fire during the race. He crawled out covered with flames. Police and spectators smothered the fire and put him in an ambulance. He was placed in an oxygen tent after receiving several transfusions, but died a short time later.

Close Race In Quebec Hockey League Continues

MONTREAL, (CP) — Quebec Hockey League teams, another heavy week-end of campaigning behind them, still are scrambling for top spot in the seven-team loop. Only four points separate the first four teams. Chicoutimi Saguenens, with 23 victories and five ties in 46 games, led the league with 51 points. Two more than Sherbrooke Saints and Montreal Royals tied for second with 48. One point behind are Valleyfield Braves while Ottawa Senators are fifth with 46 points. Next are Quebec Aces with 42 points, and Springfield Indians, with 39 points, round out the league. Saguenens have scored more goals than any other teams in the league—160. This is five more than Sherbrooke and 10 more than the Royals, next best scorers. Four teams—Sherbrooke, Montreal, Ottawa and Quebec—have fewer goals against them than Chicoutimi which has been scored on 141 times in 46 games. In Sunday games, Valleyfield outscored Royals 5-3. Sherbrooke downed Chicoutimi by a similar score and Quebec ran roughshod over Ottawa 8-2. Saturday it was Ottawa 6 Montreal 2. Chicoutimi 4 Valleyfield 2 and Springfield 3 Quebec 1.

Criticism Of Housing Bill's Resumed

OTTAWA, (CP)—A Progressive Conservative member of the Commons said Monday the government's new housing legislation will turn lending institutions into mere agents for the government. J. M. Macdonnell (PC-Toronto) Greenwood said one section of the measure will leave lenders "practically no choice" but to foreclose on mortgages when payments are in default. Under the new plan of insuring mortgages, banks and other lending institutions would be unable to depart from the housing regulations in making their loans. For fear of losing the government's guarantee on the mortgage. Mr. Macdonnell criticized the "wide, inclusive, meticulous and permanent powers" given the government's Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation under the Commons' third day of debate on the housing bill.

Protest Rhubarb At Chatham Game

CHATHAM, (CP)—The Ontario Hockey Association will receive verbal and written protests on Friday night's rhubarb during a Windsor-Chatham OHA Senior A game. S. L. Clunis, chairman of the Chatham arena management committee, said Monday. The rhubarb occurred in the third period of the game in Chatham which ended in the worst brawl in Chatham area history. It began when Gord Byers, Chatham Maroons' defenseman, and Windsor forward Frank Battage began fighting. Players from both teams joined in the fray and fighting broke out in the stands. The Ontario Anthem had to be played twice to end the brawl. Mr. Clunis said the letter would suggest "that such a situation should be corrected now rather than having any Maritime Hockey League develop in Ontario. I think it can be done only by severe penalties to those involved."

No Iron Curtain At Olympic Village Near Melbourne

MELBOURNE, (AP)—There will be no Iron Curtain at Olympic Village, 10 miles from the centre of Melbourne, during the 1956 Olympic Games. Plans for the village show that living quarters of the Western nations and the Russians will be separated only by a small area of dining rooms and shops. The village of new apartment houses and five-room cottages built to accommodate 6,000 athletes will be spread over 42 acres of park land but will be so centralized that there will be easy access to all facilities. The Communists will occupy flats and cottages at the north end of the village on a street named "Liberty avenue." The English-speaking bloc will be at the south end, in modern three-story apartments. Work Already Begun Construction of the village will begin in earnest after the Queen's visit next month. Already six months' preliminary work has been done. Leonard Currow, a deputy technical director of the Games who was at Helsinki in 1952, said plans of the village incorporate all the good features of the Finnish show while eliminating the bad ones. For example there will be no central kitchen and no one big central dining rooms as at Kappala, the main Olympic village near Helsinki. Instead there will be six kitchens and six dining areas easily accessible to the athletes. Each of the six sections will have localized services such as laundry, valet and barber shops. This is to prevent long queues and delayed service. Life to purchase a \$10,000 house. Part of the reason for high building costs was the desire for every house to be different from its neighbor.
