### Provincial Plowing Ch'ship Will Be Decided Sept. 15

The Provincial plowing championship will be decided Sept. 15 when the competition will be staged on the farm of Milford Ellis, West Cape.

The Prince County championship will be decided on the same farm Sept. 14, and first and second place winners are eligible to compete.

The Queens County champion and runner-up will be decided on Saturday of this week on the farm of James Robertson, Alexandra. The Kings County champion and runner-up will be decided next Thursday afternoon at the annual plowing meet at Dundas.

Ralph MacLennan has been named manager of the various events at West Cape, and Raynall MacNeill, Mt. Royal, is president of the Prince County Plowing Match Association

which is holding its eighth annual meet.

Arthur Hudson, Cascumpec, last year won the Prince County title for the fourth time. He will be in the running again this year.

Barry Wilson, Cornwall, won the provincial title last year and Harold Godfrey, Cornwall, was runner-up. But Mr. Godfrey is not eligible to represent the Island in the Canadian meet, as only one man can compete from one county. The alternate is Edwin Mills, Bay Fortune, who placed third last year.

But Mr. Mills said at Souris yesterday it is doubtful if he can go to the Canadian match because of pressure of farm work. He has represented the Island four times already in the Canadian match. It is being held this year on the Masey-Ferguson farm at Milliken, Ont., Oct. 11 and 12.

### Islander Dies In Car Crash

Stewart Alan Harrison, 50, of Hamilton, Ont., and a former Islander died in the wreckage of his car after it was in collision with a tractor-trailer on the Burlington Skyway Bridge near Hamilton.

Police said the tractor-trailer jumped the median strip and Mr. Harrison's car hit the side of the trailer.

It took more than an hour to free the body from the wreck, police said.

### Nfld. Aerial Search Resumes For Plane Missing 11 Months

HALIFAX (CP) — An aerial search resumed Wednesday over western Newfoundland for a plane that disappeared last November with four persons aboard.

The air-sea rescue centre here said a helicopter and a Dakota aircraft from the RCAF's 103 rescue unit at Greenwood, N.S., will search over hilly and wooded terrain between South Brook and the headwaters of Crabe's River for a trace of a missing Cessna 180.

The small plane, owned by Newfoundland Air Transport Ltd., disappeared Nov. 11 on a 60-mile flight from South Brook to the Crabe's River area.

Aborted were the pilot, Swiss-born Otto Fuhrer, E. P. Power of Corner Brook, and Mr. and Mrs. Harry Louka, operators of a hunting and fishing lodge at Highlands, Nfld. They were on a trip to survey locations for new fishing and hunting lodges in the Crabe's River area.

United States Air Force, RCAF and civilian planes searched more than two weeks without finding a sign of the plane.

The search resumed Wednesday in the belief that the missing plane, if it had crashed in a hilly or wooded area, may have been obscured by heavy snow that fell during the original search period.

The two RCAF aircraft were expected to continue the current search for at least two days, using Ernest Harmon Field at Stephenville, Nfld., as their base of operations.

Visiting members from the Parkdale Lions Club, Steve MacDonald, Ron Leary, and Tommy Kays, and Clark Duncan of the Annapolis Royal Lions Club, N.S., were guests at the meeting.

### Ferries Start Fall Schedule September 8

BORDEN — Canadian National's Northumberland Strait ferry service will introduce its fall schedule Sept. 8 with the end of the summer tourist season.

During the summer, record traffic was carried between Borden, P.E.I. and Cape Tormentine, N.B. with the most frequent service ever offered.

The fall schedule will be in effect from Sept. 8 to Nov. 30 inclusive.

It will offer 20 crossings or 10 round trips each day, commencing on both sides of the Strait.

Ferries leave Borden and Cape Tormentine during the morning at 8.25, 10.05 and 11.30 for the 55-minute crossing. Afternoon and evening crossings are at 12.50, 2.15, 3.40, 5.45, 7.30 and 9.15.

CN's Strait service ferries are the MV Abegweit, SS Prince Edward Island, MV Confederation with the SS Scotia II on standby service.

One big upset was registered at the Exhibition in Souris Wednesday when a team of Clydesdale horses owned and shown by Preston Bryenton, Rollo Bay, defeated a pair of Clivedales that had topped the provincial exhibition at Charlottetown last month. The champions at Charlottetown were owned by John Gillis of St. Peter's.

Mr. Bryenton also showed the champion horse of the show. He was one of the team that upset the provincial champion Gillis pair, Judge George Kitson, Hampshire, was loud in his praise of the big gelding.

The 4-H Club members stole the show yesterday with the exhibit of calves, and Judge Lincoln Dewar of New Perth, who placed the Holsteins, said "It was a great class. There were 14 splendid calves, the best calves I've ever seen at a local club show."

Star of the 4-H clubbers was Anne Campbell, Little Harbor. She had four first-place ribbons which represented a first for her calf a first for showmanship, a first for her yearling and another red ribbon in the class for 4-H potatoes. To that she added a first in the open classes for her heifer calf And when the Holstein champions were named, Miss Campbell emerged with the reserve female champion.

Unfortunately the book with names of 4-H Club classes was not available, so that names of other winners in this exceptionally fine exhibition were not available last night.
