## LATEST NEWS FROM CHINA

### Russia in the Ascendant.

#### HER TROOPS POURING INTO PEKIN

She is Playing a Masterful Game to the Chagrin of all Other Powers.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

LONDON, Sept. 12.—No news has been received that the Pao Ting Fu expedition has actually started.

An undated message from Tien Tsin reports that it was delayed by bad weather.

Shanghai correspondents confirm the assertion of Dr. Morrison, the Pekin correspondent of the Times, that the military parade through the Imperial Palace was a Russian triumph.

Dr. Morrison's account comes as a timely reinforcement of opinions beginning to be expressed in the London papers to the effect that, in spite of all her talk about the evacuation of Pekin, Russia has made no sign of withdrawal; but, on the contrary, is continually shipping fresh troops from Odesa to China.

The Shanghai correspondent of the Morning Post says: It is considered certain that Li Hung Chang has bribed Russia and Germany to evacuate Pekin, the former will get Manchuria. It is not known what terms have been offered Germany.

A despatch from Shanghai gives the report that the Americans and French nearly came into a conflict in Pekin because the former had insisted upon entering the palace before the formal entrance of the international troops.

LONDON, Sept. 11.—Dr. Morrison, the Pekin correspondent of the Times, reports as follows: "Since the relief of the legations, one feature stands conspicuous, viz., predominance of Russia and the overwhelming position she is now asserting here.

The pageant in the forbidden city was a triumphant entry by Russia. Russia was followed by the other powers. Russia did the honors, greatly to the chagrin of the other ministers. Russian troops are pouring into Pekin daily, nineteen hundred coming yesterday and two thousand eight hundred the day before. Already the Russians outnumber the Japanese and they will soon outnumber the combined forces. Their stay is assuming every character of permanency.

The Cossacks daily raid the country and drive the Chinese laborers in herds through the deserted and dismantled city, setting them to build their military camps. No one, not even Sir Claude McDonald, is allowed to enter the Summer Palace, and the splendid palace buildings within it are the special domain which is occupied by the Russians without permission. The expected arrival of Vice Admiral Alexeff, who, it is announced, will remain during the winter, indicates the importance which Russia attaches to future developments.

OTTAWA, Sept. 12.—According to a report received at the Department of Agriculture the bubonic plague has got a footing at San Francisco, although a system of secrecy has been adopted for keeping the matter quiet.

The accomplishment is from fifteen to twenty millions away from the promise. —Montreal Gazette.

## HORRIBLE MASSACRE IN CHINA

### Children Butchered Before Their Parents' Eyes

#### WOMEN RAVISHED AND TAKEN IN CAPTIVITY

Yet the European Troops at Pekin Remain Inactive.

LONDON, Sept. 12.—The Times publishes additional advices from its Pekin correspondent, under date of August 31st.

The censorship makes it difficult, says the correspondent, to convey a true picture of the present in Pekin.

Today the foreign community was thrilled with horror at the news of the massacre of missionaries at Pao Ting Fu, who were under the protection of the Imperial troops. Children were butchered before the eyes of their parents. White women were ravished and carried into captivity. Parents were tortured and murdered. Massacres by red Indians never called in vain for vengeance yet the troops remain here inactive. Their one thought and wish is to be given work or to be recalled from Pekin. Surely the civilized world will not suffer this cruel massacre to remain unavenged and make no effort to ascertain the fate of the poor martyred Christians and white women.
