

No Surplus Reported In Butter

OTTAWA (CP)—Butter stocks are approaching their seasonal high but federal officials see no surplus building up.

As of Aug. 1 stocks totalled 95,628,000 pounds. The figure embraces everything except stocks on retail shelves. It includes a small amount of butter in a form converted for storage.

The Aug. 1 total will be surpassed when the annual peak stockpile period is reached around Oct. 1. Production is sharply higher in the summer. The 1965 peak will be well above 100,000,000 pounds.

Stocks will decline throughout the winter when domestic consumption of 1,000,000 pounds a day is fairly stable throughout the year—outstrips production. Officials see no return to the huge surpluses of the early 60s.

EXPECT BALANCE

Officials expect butter consumption and production in 1965 to be roughly in balance for the third year in a row. Production of 200,161,000 pounds for the first half of 1965 is down a little from the same period last year when it totalled 206,582,000 pounds.

Most of the butter stockpile is government-owned. The agricultural stabilization board has bought it at 64 cents a pound since 1958 to support the price.

Butter exports appear to be falling back sharply with the return of a balanced domestic market. First-half exports this year total 5,151,000 pounds, a far cry from the 113,666,000 sold abroad last year.

Current stocks are regarded as normal for the Canadian situation by the board, allowing the federal agency to control the market.

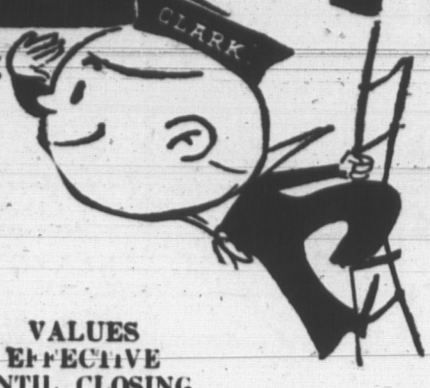
