

## Former Alberton Resident Dies

The death occurred suddenly on Friday, Dec. 3, 1954, at the Prince County Hospital, Summerside, of Mrs. Emma Chute, widow of the late Murray Chute of Bridgetown, N.S., in her 86th year. Mrs. Chute, who spent her early life in Alberton, P.E.I., in 1906 she moved with her parents, the late John and Emma (Fish) Wilkinson to Bridgetown, N.S., where she resided until 1950 when she came to Borden to live with her daughter, Mrs. Harold Coggins.

She was a member of Gordon Providence United Church, Bridgetown, and a life member of the Women's Missionary Society. She was also a member of the Borden Social Club, taking an active part in all activities.

She is survived by one daughter, Myrtle, Mrs. Harold Coggins, and one grandson, Ivan Chute, Saint John, N.B. Her husband and one son, Lloyd, predeceased her. A funeral service was held on Sunday afternoon at the Bowness Funeral Home, conducted by Rev. George K. Ward. A solo, "O Love That Will Not Let Me Go," was rendered by Mrs. W. S. Jardine, Port Egin, N.B. The remains are being forwarded to Bridgetown, N.S., where a service will be held in the Gordon Providence United Church with burial in Riverside Cemetery, Bridgetown.

He is also a member and past master of True Brothers Masonic Lodge at Crapaud.

Mr. Myers is a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Abraham Myers of Hampton, and Mrs. Myers is the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Dixon of Dixon's Mills, near Hampton.

At the anniversary observance Mrs. Myers wore a watch and chain, her wedding present of fifty years ago.

## Let's Talk It Over

—During the recent bye-election campaign in Prince County we heard a speaker say that the Liberal candidate had wasted a lot of time with "Toryism". We gathered that the speaker was in a jocular mood at the time, speaking with tongue in cheek, as it were; but the remark reminded us that this attitude actually prevails among some of our people. They seem to think that working on the side of the opposition party is just so much wasted effort. This is far from the truth.

Actually it is Her Majesty's local opposition which represents the heart and soul and spirit of our democracy. All countries, even Russia, have government parties. Russia, however, has no opposition party. Thank Heaven we have. The more flourishing condition the opposition is in, the nearer are we to the ideal of democratic procedure. The weaker and more ineffectual the men who sit in the opposition, the closer we are to bureaucratic government.

Indeed there is some danger that our opposition parties in Canada may not be wielding a big enough stick. This of course depends almost as much on the quality as the quantity in opposition, because the opposition is nearly always voted down in any case and it is the strong and forceful expression of opinion that comes from the left benches that should have a salutary effect on government procedure.

In the last analysis it is the people who elect the government party and decide how large a majority it shall have. On the other hand, the strength of our election system is watered down in direct proportion to the percentage of people whose choices are made by the spoils motives or corrupt practices. When everything is tallied up, we are probably a good deal short of the ideal of democracy.

But the lowest grade of democracy is so far above Grade A Totalitarianism that we cannot believe that Communism can ever make serious inroads into the beliefs of our people.

## Sport Echoes From Prince County

—A contemporary sports writer has given us a gentle slap on the wrist (figuratively speaking) for our recent "Echoes" concerning the appointment of a physical fitness director for Prince County. Please accept our excuses which are penned below:

First of all, it is quite true that we were unaware that two Summerside men had applied for the position, and had been turned down. Secondly, we did hear, during an informal discussion before a scheduled sports meeting, a man give us an impression that the appointment of a physical fitness director might be made if a suitable man could be found. The man speaking was the most likely person in Summerside to know the circumstances, so we attached a good deal of weight to his opinion.

This opinion was given fairly recently probably after the applicants had received their disappointing replies. Since it was given before seven or eight people, and since no pledge of secrecy was asked for, we took it for granted that it could be discussed further. In fact one of the names mentioned as an ideal person who in the future might be secured as a permanent man for the position, and we agreed heartily to that suggestion.

We cannot agree with the sports writer that the only normal procedure in such cases is to ask for applications for the position. Quite often with positions requiring qualifications such as this one, it is a question of the job seeking the man rather than the man seeking the job. We would not be surprised if that was how Jimmy Hogan, the director who retired this fall, received the appointment.

It is interesting to note that at the trade meeting held in Summerside on Thursday evening a gentleman expressed the same opinion as we had echoed in our notes, to wit, that an appointment should be made if a suitable man could be secured. Whether the gentleman had heard anything to make him think this, or was just giving his own unsupported opinion, we do not know. Certainly we hadn't seen our remarks as they appeared the same day as the Board of Trade meeting report.

We are still of the opinion that this matter of appointing a suc-

cessor to Jimmie Hogan requires a lot of thought. Every good-looking boy connected with sports is not potential material for such a post. He must have, among other things, a lot of organizational ability and be able to handle youth with a tact and understanding. We wouldn't be so presumptuous as to pass judgment on any applicants? But it will certainly take a man with high qualifications indeed to fill the shoes vacated by the highly capable James, Jr.
