IN MEMORIAM FRANCIS BRADLEY

The death of Francis Bradley occurred at his home in South Melville on Wednesday, June 18, 1952. Living with him at the time of his death were his son Wilfred and granddaughter Anne.

The deceased was born at South Melville, May 15, 1876, and he was the last male member of the family of the late John J. Bradley and Rose (Duffy) Bradley to go to his eternal reward. In 1903 he married Margaret Woods of Kelly's Cross, and settled on a farm adjacent to where he was born. Together with much sacrifice and hard work they built a fine farm home. Though they had to go without many of the comforts and luxuries of the present day they were never known to complain. To his neighbors he was charitable and helpful at all times.

He was a faithful and devoted member of St. Joseph's Church, Kelly's Cross, and of the Holy Name Society. At the time of his death he was president of the latter organization. Rarely did he miss church service, oftentimes travelling over almost impassable roads and many times in adverse weather conditions.

For half a century he was active in community affairs; for many years he was a church trustee and also served different terms as school trustee. His advice was sound and practical, for it was the product of age and experience. His wife predeceased him in November, 1950. Of a family of nine children six remain to mourn his passing: Mary (Mrs. John Cusack), Emyvale; also the following sons: Joseph, Bolton, Mass.; Charles, Woodstock, N.B.; Maurice and Edwin of Kelly's Cross, and Wilfred of South Melville. One daughter Kathleen, and one son George predeceased him some years ago. His second eldest son Cecil died in March 1947. He is also survived by two sisters, Annie (Mrs. A. J. Bartholomew), and Mary, both of Boston.

His funeral, which was under the direction of Damian Trainor, was held from his late residence to St. Joseph's Church, Kelly's Cross, where Requiem Mass was celebrated by his pastor, Rev. K. C. MacMillan, who also officiated at the grave. The pallbearers were: Peter Greenan, Gerald Monaghan, Peter Toole, Emmett Gorman, Emmett McQuaid and Fred Bradley.

Now that his voice is silent and his work completed, he has gone to enjoy the fruits of his labour. May the blessings of God shine upon him for all eternity.
