## THE FALL OF SANTIAGO.

Is Confidently Expected for Today.

GENERAL SHAFTER WILL BLOW IT OFF THE MAP.

If the Spaniards Refuse to Surrender the City.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

WASHINGTON, July 5.—Santiago will either surrender by noon today, or be blown off the map of Cuba.

This is the American ultimatum, and the army and navy has received instructions to prepare to bombard the city.

The surrender was to have occurred this morning, but the Spanish Government refused to yield to demand of General Shafter.

By ten today, all the women and children must be out of the city or else they will fall victims to the missiles which will fall in a fierce shower upon the doomed town.

Whether Santiago surrenders before the time of the ultimatum expires or succumbs to the bombardment, the American flag will certainly float over the city before night-fall.

## REINFORCEMENTS GETTING READY

For Either Santiago or Porto Rico.

SHAFTER MAY NOT NEED THEM FOR SANTIAGO,

In Which Case They Will go to Porto Rico.

WASHINGTON, July 5.—The matter of reinforcements for the American position at Santiago was taken up by the board yesterday which concluded that before reinforcements could reach General Shafter he necessity at that point would be passed.

Troop, however, will be sent, but they are not in the nature of reinforcements.

The troops, it is stated, will be despatched as early as possible; but whether they will go direct to Cuba or to Porto Rico, the next point of attack, is yet a matter of some doubt.

## THE DESTRUCTION OF CERVERA'S FLEET

Almost Took The Americans by surprise.

IN TRYING TO ESCAPE FROM SANTIAGO.

But the Yankees Were too Much for Him.

NEW YORK, July 5.—A despatch says there can be no doubt that Admiral Cervera's plan to escape from Santiago harbor was entirely unexpected by Admiral Sampson, the best evidence of this is the fact that when the Spanish vessels were seen coming out of the harbor the flag ship New York was seven miles away steaming to the eastward, toward Jur gua, the military base, nine miles east of Mario.

The New York was out of the fight altogether at every stage, but she immediately put about and followed the others.

NAVY DEPARTMENT WILL EXPEDITE MATTERS.

The Important Spanish Coast Cities to be Bombarded.

With all opposition to Sampson's fleet, removed Watson will sail at the earliest possible moment.
