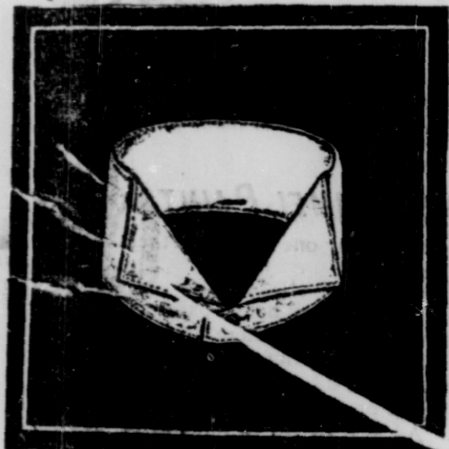




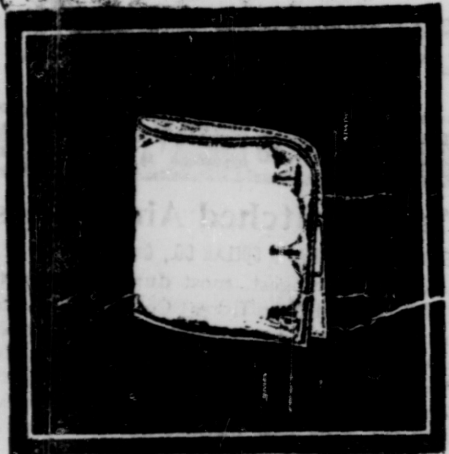

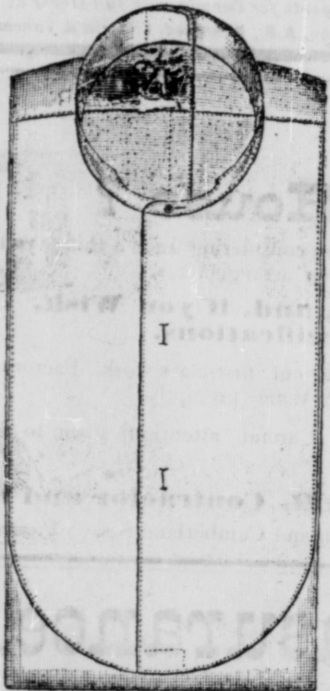

THE NEWS FROM OTTAWA.

Parliament Still Wrestling With the Tariff.

Amendments Regarding the Duty on Oil Voted Down.

OTTAWA, June 5.—In the Commons yesterday Mr. McDougall (Cape Breton) brought up the matter of the Baie des Chaleurs Railway, enquiring whether it was true that the Intercolonial had lost \$30,000 in the operation of that road for a few months.

Hon. Mr. Fielding promised the information later when the House would be asked to make a supplementary vote for the Intercolonial.

The Ways and Means Committee devoted most of the afternoon to discussing the wheat duty.

A few changes have been made in the book tariff. On the motion of Hon. Mr. Fielding, sheets and parts of books were included among the class of novels at 20 per cent. Cigar box labels are changed from 15 cents a pound to 35 per cent. and putty from 15 per cent to 20 per cent.

When the oil item was reached Mr. Richardson (Manitoba) asked that oil be placed on the free list. The motion was quickly declared defeated.

Mr. Ellis moved a reduction from five cents to three cents.

Mr. Rogers (Patron) seconded the motion.

Mr. Talbot (Ministerialist) supported the amendment.

Sir Charles Tupper thought he would have to come to the rescue of the government. He was of opinion that a reduction would crush out an important industry and place Canada under the Standard Oil monopoly and do no good to consumers.

McDonald (Huron, Government) said he had made many campaign speeches for free oil but now he had made up his mind that the industry could not stand a reduction.

Mr. Davin wanted free oil.

Mr. Flint regretted that he could not support the motion though he observed that it was in line with his own speech and votes while in opposition. He had since discovered that the oil industry would be endangered by the proposed reduction and he never intended to destroy it.

Mr. Davin offered to quote Hon. Mr. Davies on the oil question when the minister raised a laugh by jocosely asking "Did I ever speak on coal?"

Mr. Fraser (Government) who represents an oil district made a lengthy address defending oil and denouncing the Standard Oil Company.

Mr. Ganong moved that the duty be four cents. The motion was lost.

Mr. Davin moved that it be one cent, which motion was also lost.

As no standing vote was taken on these motions it was not known who voted for the amendments.

In the Senate Sir Oliver Mowat said that at an early date the Government would make an official announcement of its policy with reference to the Plebiscite.

Feeling that both sides of the House are strongly in favor of an early prorogation. The session may end in two weeks.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL.

ATHENS, June 3.—It is officially announced that an armistice has been signed between the Greek and Turkish military commanders in Thessaly and Epirus.

LONDON, June 3.—A despatch to the News from Berlin says that a 10-year old boy has committed suicide there because a smaller piece of cake was given to him than was given to his sister.

DUBLIN, June 3.—It is reported that the aldermen of Dublin, at their coming meeting, will elect John Redmond, the Parnellite leader and member of parliament for Waterford, to the office of Lord Mayor of Dublin.

LONDON, June 3.—The Japanese loan of 43,000,000 yen, equivalent to about \$21,987,916, at five per cent. and payable in gold the issue price of which is 1.01, was subscribed to-day several times over within an hour.

CONSTANTINOPLE, June 3.—Elhem Pa-ba has given all merchants 15 days in which to withdraw their goods from the custom house at Volo. At the expiration of that time all goods remaining in the custom house will be confiscated by the Turkish government.

LISBON, June 3.—During an exchange of salutes, yesterday, an ill-considered breach caused an explosion on the Austrian man-of-war Wien. The shock was terrific. One of the gunners was killed and several others were seriously injured. The barrette was completely destroyed.

WASHINGTON, June 3.—The resignation of the Canovas cabinet at Madrid excites much interest in official quarters here owing to its possible effect upon the policy of Spain toward Cuba and the attitude of the United States toward the conflict.

CONSTANTINOPLE, June 3.—The ambassadors of the powers and Tewfik Pa-ba, the Turkish minister for foreign affairs, held the first sitting of the peace negotiations this afternoon at the "Tophani" palace. There was no secretary present, and no record will be kept of the proceedings.
