### Claims Maritime Rates On C.N.R. Favorable

HALIFAX, June 28 — "On traffic originating within the Maritime times we have on many occasions reached down to the rock bottom of out-of-pocket costs to provide favourable rates which will stimulate the movement of large volume traffic," Donald Gordon, C.M.G., chairman and president, Canadian National Railways, said this week when he appeared as principal speaker at the 30th annual dinner of the Halifax Board of Trade.

Following a brief reference to competitive freight rates enjoyed by Maritime ports despite much longer rail hauls compared with those to competing U. S. ports, he said: "The railways have always endeavoured to provide and maintain the lowest possible rates for basic raw materials and foodstuffs which move in large quantities — commodities such as grain, fish, fruit, pit props, potatoes and pulpwood, but our ability to do so has been seriously menaced by highway competitors who are free to skim the cream of the traffic and not pay their proportionate share of highway taxes."

This issue lies at the heart of what is commonly called "the railway problem," Mr. Gordon stated, "and we are asking that road-rail competition be placed on a fair and equitable footing both in the matter of regulations and responsibility for costs."

"We are seeking to have each transportation agency operate in the field in which it is most efficient so that the total transportation bill of this country will be minimized. If it is not done, this additional rate structure might collapse and our whole economy would be shaken by the event."

It was not inappropriate, he said, to point out that the Canadian National Railways was the largest single industrial enterprise in the Maritimes in terms of wages and salaries paid out and the cost of materials bought within this region each year. You may be surprised to learn that our investment in physical property in the Maritime Provinces is in excess of \$4,000,000. This demonstrated that the relations between the railway and the Maritimes were very much that of a partnership.
