## 500 Flock To Hilltop In Hope Of Seeing Vision

**BATHURST, N. B.** (CP)-An estimated 500 devout Roman Catholics, singing hymns and reciting prayers, flocked to a hilltop here Wednesday night hoping to see a vision of the Blessed Virgin.

In below freezing temperature, many of them knelt before a cluster of trees where, 24 hours earlier, a young girl at play claimed to have seen the shimmering likeness of a lady in white, wearing a crown of gold.

Bishop Camille Leblanc, spiritual leader of the church's Bathurst diocese, declined comment on the occurrence except to say that the church has taken no official recognition of the child's tale.

Other informants said the girl, whose name could not be learned, told of seeing the white-garmented figure shining ethereally in the trees on Pine Hill. A group of church buildings, including a hospital, the bishop's residence and St. Joseph's retreat house, are nearby.

**NUMBERS INCREASE**  
The girl called to other playmates with whom she had been sliding on the hill about 6 p. m. Tuesday. Some of the youngsters, it was said, also claimed to have seen the vision. But they told conflicting stories when questioned Wednesday.

## Old Canadian Embassy In Paris Sold

**PARIS (CP)**-The Canadian embassy property on the Avenue Foch in Paris has been purchased by ex-ile magnate Marcel Bouscassac, sometimes called the richest man in France.

Ambassador Jean Desy and his staff of about 60 will move to a new building, still in the drawing-board stage, on the Avenue Montaigne. The transfer may take two years to complete.

Plans for the new embassy have been prepared by Antoine Monette of Montreal, departmental architect for the external affairs department. Work is expected to start this month. Monette declined to give details, saying it will just be an "ordinary" building.

### DEMOLISH BUILDING

First step will be demolition of the gloomy, grey building, once the residence of the Duc de Broglie, which now stands on the Avenue Montaigne site. This tall, neoclassical, old-fashioned structure, next to the Plaza Athenee Hotel where visiting Canadian officials usually stay, is being used meanwhile as temporary annex offices by a Canadian treasury section under Roger Hetu of Montreal and an 11-member RCAF movement control section headed by Flt. Lt. Wilfrid Groulx of Ottawa.

Canada's diplomatic mission in France, started as a legation in 1928, has been located for the last eight years at 72 Avenue Foch, the broad boulevard known to Paris as the "Street of Diplomats". Nearby on a tiny dead-end street is the imposing residence of Lord Ismay, NATO secretary-general. Canadian officials will have to be wary about inviting their wives to meet them at the Avenue Montaigne headquarters. Just across the road is the fashion house of Christian Dior, whose fleet of whippet - slim models often stop traffic as they pose negligently outside the Dior building for slick-magazine shots.

What Bouscassac paid for the old embassy property and what he plans to do with it have not been disclosed.

Bouscassac, 65, has been called France's "king of cotton." He owns some 50-odd factories employing 25,000 workers and is one of Dior's backers.

## German Army Four Years Away

**BONN (AP)** - Bonn military planners calculated Wednesday that a fighting-fit West German army is still at least four years away.

They estimated West Germany's projected contribution to the North Atlantic Treaty Organization's armed forces will be ready for combat about the end of 1958, or more likely at the beginning of 1959, if the road ahead is clear.

Responsible officials said it will take three years to train and equip the planned Streitkräfte armed forces, once the final green light is given.

The planned German contribution to NATO is 500,000 men, with 350,000 in the army, 80,000 in a tactical air force and 20,000 in a pocket-sized navy.

## May Use Dynamite At Burning Well

**LEDUC, Alta. (CP)**-The Alberta government Wednesday prohibited all unauthorized persons from entering a five - square - mile area around a burning oil well in the Leduc field 25 miles south of Edmonton.

The action was taken to mean emergency crews are ready to use a heavy charge of dynamite to blast towering flames off the well-head.

Use of the dynamite to kill the flames, roaring out of control since Dec. 21, would also probably mean that farmers in the surrounding country would have to move out of their homes until the dangerous blasting task was completed.

The dynamite method, considered by oil officials as more dangerous than use of water pumped down a directional hole nearby, was discussed Tuesday night by officials of Imperial Oil, Ltd. and V. J. Maroney and Myron Kinley, Californian oil-fire experts who arrived at the well Wednesday.

## Russian Party Reaches Ottawa

**OTTAWA (CP)** - A three-man party from the Russian agriculture ministry arrived here Wednesday and said they came to study farm machinery at the invitation of Massey-Harris-Ferguson Co. Ltd., Toronto.

"It is a return visit," said Sergei Komov. He said the Russian ministry accepted the Canadian company's invitation after a Canadian agricultural party made a similar visit to Russia last year.

Mr. Komov was accompanied by Sergei Gerasimov and Aleksei Nekretenko.

Mr. Komov said they do not know yet whether they will visit other Canadian centres or the United States.

Before coming to Canada they inspected some agricultural machinery in England.

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## Arsenal Theft At Valcartier

**VALCARTIER, Que. (CP)** - Army authorities today reported theft of 24 machine guns and 6,000 rounds of ammunition from the Valcartier army camp arsenal, 15 miles north of Quebec City.

The weapons and munitions were contained in wooden boxes and Tuesday. Army authorities said their disappearance was noted in case thieves have not had time to take the loot out of the territory.

Last autumn rifles were stolen from the camp but they were found a few days later buried in a ditch in the camp area.

## Psychopath At Large In New York

**NEW YORK (AP)**-A big, powerful man described as a "dangerous psychopath" was at large in the city Wednesday after escaping from a Montreal ship's brig by snapping his chains and overpowering two guards.

Police said the man, Robert Griffin, 32, stowed away on the Canadian National Steamship's freighter Canadian Observer in Cuba. He was discovered on the way to New York and put in irons when he became violent.

Although police proposed taking him to Bellevue psychopathic ward when the ship docked, federal authorities insisted he be left on the ship for deportation to Cuba.

Chained by the legs and in handcuffs, the six-foot, 180-pound prisoner broke both shackles. When guards brought him supper, he was covering in a corner, a bloody towel over his hands and his chains at his feet.
