THE YUKON BILL.
Klondyke Miners Oppose the Deal

UNLESS MCKENZIE CONTRACT IS MODIFIED IT WILL KILL THE YUKON.

At Ottawa, a few days ago the contract with McKenzie and Mann was criticized by Messrs. E. J. Livernash, W. A. E. Wills, ex-surgeon of the Montreal Police, and Max Landreville, a French-Canadian. The gentlemen form the deputation sent out by the miners of the Klondyke to represent their grievances to the Government, and to endeavour to obtain a modification of the regulations. All three are owners of rich claims. Their attack upon the McKee z-mann contract was made in the presence of a large gathering of Senators, and a sprinkling of members, who had assembled in response to an invitation from the miners themselves.

WOULD KILL THE KLONDIKE.
The concessions to McKenzie and Mann were so extensive and the restrictions upon miners so irksome that unless modified the present bill would kill the Klondyke as effectually as though the Government had deliberately set about accomplishing that object. The area in which prospecting was now being done, and in which 2,000 miners were at work, was limited to 864,000 acres. The land grant to McKenzie and Mann was nearly four times that amount. It might be true that the contractors could not begin to select lands until the 15th of June, as Mr. Sifton had said, but the prospector burdened with his outfit could not get into the country until late in the spring, and it would take him practically six months to do the prospecting necessary to determine him where to locate his claim in the course of which he would have to dig below 60 feet of frozen ground.

DESTRUCTIVE TO PROSPECTORS.
The right given to McKenzie and Mann to select alternate claims was destructive to the interests of prospectors, and would place him completely in their power. There were many rich claims on the hillsides of Bonanza and Eldorado creeks which had not been taken up because the miners were shut out from access to the water below. These would fall into the hands of McKenzie and Mann. The slopes were lined with timber, and with the privileges of leasing timber limits which the contractors enjoyed they might just as well have the claims. The miners could not get along without timber, which was indispensable for thawing the frozen soil, but they could obtain it only on such terms as McKenzie and Mann might dictate. When the length of claims was cut down from 500 to 100 feet prospecting stopped. Miners were not willing to risk their lives for the limited opportunities thus offered. He contrasted the position of the free miner, who had to pay license fees and ten per cent. royalty, with that of McKenzie and Mann, who would pay no license fees and one per cent. He protested against the establishment of such an autocracy in the country. One of the Ministers said to him, "Probably McKenzie and Mann would give you better terms than the Government regulations." What a position this was to put Canada into, to place these contractors in a superior position to the Government itself. Canada had a wonderful inheritance in that northern empire, and it was of tremendous importance that it should be established on a firm and just foundation.

TO CANAL THE YUKON.
The chief speaker was Mr. Livernash, who argued that by constructing a canal through the flat district of the Yukon river it would be possible to transport freight more cheaply than by the Stickeen river. At present for five months of the year, which is all that the Stickeen route is open for, transportation by the Yukon river can be done just as cheaply.

THE STICKEEN ROUTE.
Questioned with reference to the Stickeen route, Mr. Livernash said he had come to give facts, and not opinions. All he could say was that in coming out from Dawson he met a man who had come in by the Stickeen route from Wrangel, and he was the most forlorn creature he ever saw. This man had been three months in getting to the same point parties from Skaguay and Dyea had reached in two weeks, and he said, "If I could find the man that told me to come this way I'd hang him" (Laughter.)

Mr. Jardine's loss is estimated at \$400. The fire is supposed to be the work of an incendiary.

C. M. B. A.—On Wednesday night last branch 261, of the C. M. B. A., at Souris was visited, addressed and inspected by Provincial Deputy, Rev. Father Burke, of Alberton. The reverend gentleman found the branch in a most satisfactory condition, and in his very appropriate remarks took occasion to congratulate all concerned. Speeches of welcome and thanks to the Rev. Grand Deputy were made by Dr. McLellan, D. F. McDonald, J. J. Hughes, Capt. Laungan and Rev. Father McIntyre, of East Point. A number of new members were proposed.
