

PM Determined To Boost Grants To Universities

OTTAWA (CP) — Prime Minister St. Laurent indicated Monday he plans to go through with his plan for expanding federal grants to universities whether or not they are accepted in Quebec.

The new grants, like the present ones, would be "available" to the Quebec institutions, Mr. St. Laurent told reporters. He said he hopes the universities there will realize there is "no danger to them by accepting them."

The prime minister spoke after he arrived by train from his Quebec City home where last week-end he and Premier Duplessis debated at long distance through statements to the press the issue of federal assistance to universities.

In a speech Oct. 7 at Sherbrooke, Que., Mr. St. Laurent said he will ask Parliament to

double the scale of the present \$8,000,000 annual grants to universities. He said he had asked the National Conference of Canadian Universities to take over the job of distributing the money.

ACCEPTED ONE GRANT

Quebec universities have never accepted federal grants, except for one year after they were started in 1951.

Premier Duplessis, who has criticized the grants as violating an exclusively provincial field, said Friday the new federal plan is simply a "side door" means of trespassing on provincial rights.

Monday, Mr. St. Laurent was asked whether the proposed new grants program is conditional on acceptance by Quebec universities.

"I hope the Quebec universities will feel they should accept the

grants," he replied.

"If they don't accept them, they will still be available and I hope that some day they will realize there is no danger to them in accepting them."

He was asked whether he expects the universities conference will accept the job of distributing the money.

"If the conference declines, he replied, "we will have to find some other way. But I don't expect the conference of universities to say they won't accept the grants."

In a statement to the press at Quebec Saturday night, Mr. St. Laurent said there is "clear impression" that Quebec universities are not taking the federal grants only because Premier Duplessis does not want them to accept.

Funeral Monday Of Dr. G. Boyle At Antigonish

ANTIGONISH, N.S. (CP) — More than 1,200 students and associates paid final tribute Monday to Dr. George Boyle, author, editor and journalist professor at St. Francis Xavier University here. He was 54.

Dr. Boyle was editor of the weekly Antigonish Casket at his death Friday.

He was author of books on the Antigonish co-operative movement and had worked on American newspapers.

He was widely known, especially in the journalistic field which he entered shortly after graduating from St. Francis Xavier university in 1925. He worked with the St. Peterburg Times, the Plant City Courier in Florida, and later with Griffin News Bureau, Washington and the Freeman Palmer Publications in New York.

He was the pioneer editor of the Maritime Cooperator when it came into existence as the "Excelsior Bulletin" in 1939, to provide an official voice for cooperativism in the Maritimes. He was principal editor of the publication until he retired in 1947.

He has been a prolific writer in social, economic and religious topics for newspapers and periodicals, but is perhaps best known as the principal chronicler of the main figures of the Antigonish movement. He is the author of four books: "Democracy's Second Chance," "Pioneer in Purple," "The Poor Man's Prayer," and "Father Tompkins of Nova Scotia."

Proud Of Being A Canadian In Korea, Rotarians Told

"Concern for human beings has been the motive of the people of Korea for hundreds of years. They have a unique culture, culture, their own language and distinctive dress," Miss Helen G. McArthur, National Director of Nursing Services of the Canadian Red Cross Society said in an address before the Rotary Club at the weekly luncheon held at the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday.

Miss McArthur began to realize the background of Korea when she read the year book for the calendar 1954 indicating our era and opposite it 4287, the Korean calendar year.

Describing the people of Korea Miss McArthur stressed the fact that they were stubborn and music loving, proud and happy even in their war-ridden surroundings. They are sometimes called "The Irish of the Orient," as they invariably have a smile on their face and a song on their lips, even on an empty stomach."

OCCUPATION

Miss McArthur traced the development of the Red Cross movement there which took fifty-one years to achieve the aim of National recognition against the interruptions of wars. Shortly after the Red Cross was established in Korea, the country was occupied by Japan and for 35 years the

National President Addresses Prov. Home & School Meeting

While perhaps it is a difficult job to be a good parent or a good teacher, it is most rewarding because while you are struggling to help children you are in reality helping yourself," said Mrs. J.D. Taylor, National President of Home and School addressing the semi annual Provincial meeting of Home and School at Prince of Wales College last night Mrs. J. Lantz, president.

Mrs. Taylor said Home and School is a co-operative venture on the part of parents and teacher the one reason for which is to discover the needs of children and how these needs can be met.

While she spoke of the co-operative effort she emphasized the need of individual effort—the desire for each to become a better person.

The speaker said it was necessary to try to reach some understanding as to the meaning of education and its importance as it applies to the present day.

KNOWLEDGE NOT ENOUGH

"One thing we have to realize is the increase in knowledge which is taking place in our civilization," she said. "We have to send our young people out into the world with a respect for the basic truths of goodness, mercy, charity and service to ones fellowman. If knowledge were enough it would be very simple. We must give to our children a service to education. We can't be bystanders. The enduring values that we can give our children are to be found in the simple process of daily living. If you want your children to have a desire for service to mankind, they must somehow find it in you," continued Mrs. Taylor. "Children are the capability of judging sincerity or insincerity in their parents."

BASIC VALUES

Mrs. Taylor reminded her audience that the struggle for basic values over the centuries has been very great and on more than one occasion these precious values have almost been lost. "We must make every effort

to retain these values," she said. "Why do we have a National organization of Home and School? was the question posed by Mrs. Taylor."

She said the voice of 300,000 members across Canada can be heard if it comes from considered opinion and because it is a national organization it can offer its support of certain programs which are considered beneficial to Canadian children. It can also give advice to school boards regarding certain financial arrangements. In other words it serves as a medium for an informed public opinion.
