Dr. A.E. Ings, of Montague, was elected president of the Prince Edward Island Veterinary Medical Association at its 36th annual meeting held at the Health Centre in Charlottetown last evening.

Dr. D.G. Moore of the veterinary division of the New Brunswick Department of Agriculture spoke on the breeding problems in cattle, during the meeting. In the course of his remarks, he mentioned the increasing risk which vets are taking in dealing with sterility in cattle. This condition has been overcome, the doctor stated, by the increased use of artificial insemination where accurate records are being maintained.

Previous to the business meeting and election of officers, the annual association dinner was held at the Old Spain, at which Dr. Frank MacKinnon, principal of P.W.C., was guest speaker. The retiring president, Dr. George Fisher, resided.

Immigration Official Confers With Government Re Refugees

Mr. A.J. Cormier, regional liaison officer for the Maritime Provinces with the Department of Citizenship and Immigration arrived in Charlottetown Thursday where he conferred with the Government members with a view to setting up a committee which will provide temporary asylum for Hungarian refugees.

Mr. Cormier said, "There a good number of people who want to help about it. This committee organized on a provincial basis and broad representative of provincial groups would act as a clearing house for the placement of refugees." It is understood that the committee will start functioning immediately.

FIRST LOAD

The first two shipments of refugees will arrive in Halifax on December 16th and 17th and will comprise approximately 1,100 souls. It is expected that 6,000 refugees will arrive by December 31.

Mr. Cormier said that for people who can accommodate families or individuals or who have a vacant house to be occupied or who have employment for the physically and mentally fit, they should for the present make their approaches through their local clergy stating what they have to offer and all other details such as the number they can accommodate, the age or sex group.

He said many of these refugees will undoubtedly possess special skills and will be able to make a contribution in their new surroundings very soon. Already many highly skilled professional men have arrived by air from Hungary.

Quebec Boosts Members' Pay

QUEBEC (CP) — Premier Duplessis said Thursday the government is considering an increase of \$2,000 annually in the indemnity of members of both houses of the Quebec legislature.

The increase would bring the indemnities of the 93 members of the legislative assembly and of the 24 members of the legislative council—provincial Upper House—to \$8,000 from \$6,000 annually.

It would also boost the salary and indemnities of cabinet ministers to \$18,000 from \$16,000. The provincial premier would collect \$24,000 instead of \$22,000.
