Death In Omaha Of Noted Island Born Architect

On May 7th, there passed away at the Clarkson Hospital, Omaha, Nebraska, John MacDonald, beloved brother of Kathleen, Mrs. Bertram Warren, Cornwall, P.E.I. Jack, as he was best known to his family and his many friends, was born at Corwall, the son of Angus MacDonald and Isabella MacAsland.

He received his early education in his native Province, later graduating from McGill University as an architect.

Moving to Nebraska, he settled in Omaha, and soon made a name for himself in architecture. Many of Omaha's prominent buildings were designed by him, among them the \$3000,000 Joslyn memorial of white marble and the greystone home of the Joslyn's prominent citizens of Omaha.

Mr. MacDonald's wife predeceased him last October and his only son, Allan, who was associated with him in his business, also predeceased him several years ago, leaving two sons, Donald and Wallace. Other surviving relatives are a nephew, Capt. A. C. MacEachern, M.C., a veteran of two World Wars who lives at York Point, and three nieces, Susan, Mrs. R. A. Arrest Three Men In Bogus Cheque Ring

OTTAWA (CP)—Three men have been arrested and charged in a continuing investigation of a bogus cheque ring which police said operated on Parliament Hill and in some cases planned to forge the signatures of members of Parliament.

The P.C., Ottawa and H.C. detectives have been working on the case. One police officer said a former member of the Ottawa Rough Rider football club is under investigation.

The police spokesman said the former footballer was not a well-known player and had subbed in one or two games for the Ottawa Big Four Club.

Reports said police discovered that one bad cheque was passed over the forged signature of an unidentified member of Parliament. There were reports that the signatures of some 25 other members of the Commons had somehow been obtained, apparently for forging purposes.

AWAIT TRIAL

RCMP said the three arrested were George Petry of Ottawa; Don Peter Kelly, a former federal government employee, and William Stewart of Ottawa.

All three are awaiting trial.

An RCMP spokesman said some of the cheques involved were expense cheques stolen from a department of the federal government.

Labrador To Sail For North Early In July

OTTAWA (CP)—The navy's Arctic patrol ship Labrador will sail from Halifax in early July to take part, for the second successive year, in the seaborne supply of the DEW (distant early warning) radar line.

The navy said Thursday it is expected that the Labrador's 1956 activities will be similar to those of last year. These included exploration and charting of sea routes to DEW line sites in the eastern Arctic, survey and selection of landing beaches and escort of supply convoys.

The ship, first naval vessel to circumnavigate North America, will also continue to carry out extensive scientific surveys of ocean currents, ice, weather and the like.

The Labrador will begin her scientific work in Hudson Strait and about mid-August will rendezvous with a task force of U.S. navy icebreakers and other ships to start supply operations in the Foxe basin area. She is expected to return to Halifax in early October.

Crown Completes Murder Case

LUNenburg, N.S. (CP)—The crown completed its case against Leroy James Llewellyn Friday after 26 witnesses testified at the trial of the 44-year-old Mill Village woodsman.

No witnesses were called in defence of Llewellyn, charged in connection with the fatal beating of 76-year-old William Ross of Italy Cross.

Defence counsel Archibald Burke will address the jury today.

Crown prosecutor F.E.L. Powke completed his address to the jury before Friday's session ended.
