ANTIGONISH, N.S. (CP) — St. Francis Xavier University captured its eighth Maritime Intercollegiate hockey championship in nine years Monday by defeating St. Thomas Tommies of Chatham, N.B., 7-0. The X-men won the two-game total-point series 10-1.

Stu Kennedy and Jake Andra each scored twice for the winners while Bob McKenzie, Doug McNeil and Greg McDougall added singles.

St. Thomas, winners of the New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island title, lacked the strong attack they displayed in the opening game and were outclassed in every department by the locals.

St. F.X. fired three first period goals and rounded out the scoring with four in the middle frame.

Wally Jammie in the St. Thomas net played an outstanding game, blocking 36 shots. Hugh Huck, a St. F.X. standout in the series opener at Chatham, turned aside 18 drives.

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Campbellton Tigers Cop Mar. Junior Hockey Title

CAMPBELLTON, N.B. (CP) — Campbellton Tigers won the Maritime Junior hockey championship Monday night, dropping Antigonish 10-4 and ousting the Bulldogs in the best-of-three series. Campbellton won the opener 7-5 at Antigonish Saturday.

Louis Lavoie, former St. Basile Aces star, again paced the Tigers with four goals. Lavoie fired home four goals in the series opener. Gil Picard added three. Jean Paul Picard, Nick Murray and Billy Payne were the other Tiger marksmen.

L. MacDonald, Chisholm, S. MacDonald and Wood were the Antigonish scorers. The Tigers led 3-1 after the first period and 6-2 after the second. Campbellton spotted the Bulldogs a goal in the final frame, then closed the scoring with four unanswered tallies.

The tigers won the right to play in the Eastern Canada Memorial Cup playoffs.

Allan MacIssac was outstanding in the Bulldogs' net in the first 20 minutes of action. The sturdy custodian, who blocked 26 shots in the first game at Antigonish, came up with 10 stops

in the opening session Monday night. Several were outstanding. At the other end of the rink Oakes was having an easy time. The Campbellton defence allowed the bulldogs to get only four shots away on Oakes, who played during the season with Charlottetown Millionaires of the Bay Chaleur Intermediate league.

The game was only two minutes and 19 seconds old when Murray scored on a pass from Payne. It was the first of three opening period points for the former Ottawa-Hull Junior Canadiens player. Payne fished the puck out of the right corner and passed back to Murray at the point. Murray outgunned one player and beat MacIssac with a hard drive from 20 feet out.

Two minutes later Wood put the bulldogs on even terms by converting a pass from Boyd. Sandy Murphy's penalty at the nine-minute mark paved the way for Payne to break the deadlock. Gil Picard shot the first period insurance marker at 11:53 with Murray and Lavoie assisting.

Jean Paul Picard opened the scoring at 2:20 after taking a pass from Murray. It was Murray's fourth point on as many

Campbellton goals. Picard's goal came following a faceoff in his own end. Murray got hold of the puck and carried to the Antigonish line where he sent Picard in on a fine passing play. Picard beat MacIssac with a close-in shot.

Chisholm scored the second Bulldog goal at 6:39 on an unassisted effort. Two minutes later

Gil Picard fired his second of the game with help coming from Dover and Lavoie.

S. MacDonald got the goal back at the 16:10 mark on another unassisted play before Lavoie closed out the second period marksmen at 18:25. The goal gave Campbellton a 6-3 lead after 40 minutes of play.

The Saints travel to Summerside this afternoon in the final game to decide the Island champs

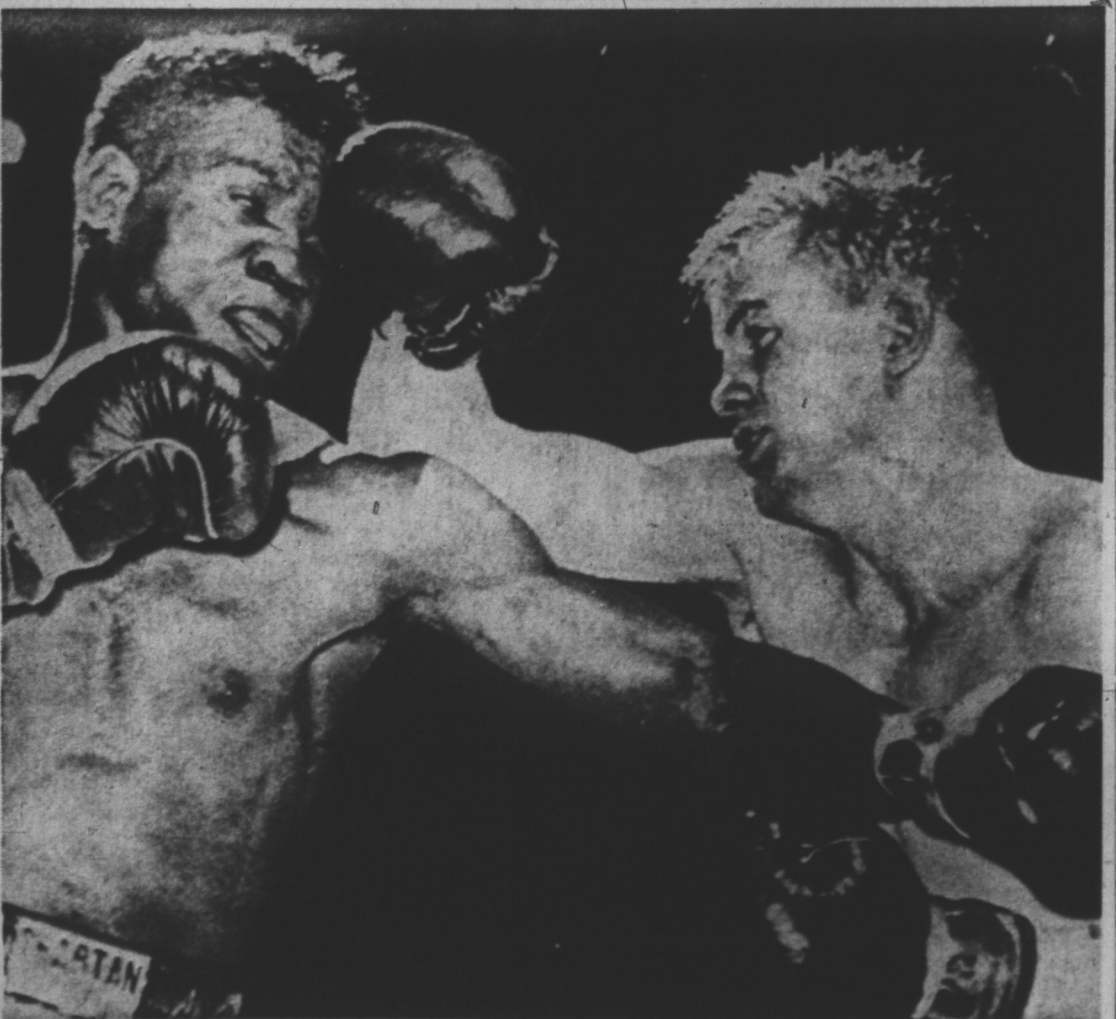
The Summerside team have a long hill to climb in overcoming a 9-goal deficit, but may just do that on home ice.
