

Dwelling Near Alma Is Destroyed By Fire Monday

The home of Mr. Emmett Ahearn, Alma, R.R., was destroyed by fire shortly after noon yesterday. The blaze was discovered by Mrs. Ahearn, who was home alone with two small children, aged two and one years. By the time she was able to notify her husband at a neighbouring house the fire was too far advanced for anything to be saved with the exception of several kitchen chairs. A large potato crop in the basement was also lost. The Alberion fire truck was able to reach the scene by travelling through the fields but arrived too late to make any attempt to control the conflagration. Origin of the fire is not known.

Moscow Charges London With Detaining Soviet Citizen

LONDON (AP)—Moscow Radio charged Sunday a ship's doctor named Biryukov, who left a Soviet vessel at Hull Dec. 22, is held captive by British secret police. Britain contends he applied for—and was granted— asylum. The broadcast account said Soviet Ambassador Jacob Malik called on the foreign office Friday "to protest the illegal detention by the British police authorities of the Soviet citizen Biryukov and insisted on his immediate release and free permission for him to return to his country." The Biryukov case has been surrounded by mystery. The matter did not come to light until last Monday, when London newspapers reported the doctor had barricaded himself in a hotel after being questioned by intelligence agents. The Daily Mail said that, throughout the night of Jan. 5, Biryukov "stamped up and down his room, banging the walls and shouting." It gave this account of the developments: "The hotel management finally refused to permit them to enter. He kept shouting 'I demand my freedom,' so police finally broke down the door. As police entered the room, Biryukov fell 15 feet from a window to the lawn below. Found with his wrists and neck slashed, he was taken to a mental hospital.

Deprecates Gordon Report

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)—The Newfoundland board of trade went into an emergency huddle Sunday and wired Prime Minister St. Laurent a protest against some suggestions of the Gordon commission report. The board said it had resolved to "deprecate the negative and defeatist suggestion of the Gordon commission as reported in the press that the people of the Maritime provinces and Newfoundland have to other sections of Canada to secure a better standard of living and a greater opportunity." "We feel," the wire read, "such an attitude is fundamentally opposed to the whole principle of Confederation and is at complete variance with the prospects held out for Newfoundland when this province joined the Canadian union in 1949."

about 700. It was revealed by Dr. Lea that the Queen Charlotte cost about \$718,000.

Mayor Stewart estimated that with the rising building costs the proposed building cost in the vicinity of a million dollars.

Dr. Lea thought it could be built for about the same as the Queen Charlotte since certain matters were learned in the construction of the other school that would result in savings.

WHAT ABOUT ADDING ON

Mayor Stewart asked whether the School Board had investigated the possibility of adding to the Queen Charlotte. Dr. Lea said such a structure would be unworkable. It would be virtually impossible to enlarge it, he said. Mr. Parker said the present facilities could be used and the extra accommodation required.

Councillor Nicholson: "Is it true that at the time the Queen Charlotte was built, the School Board continued to rent additional space for the accommodation of Queen Square pupils?"

Dr. Lea: "Not after the High School was built."

Councillor Nicholson: "Did the Roman Catholic Episcopal Corporation refuse to allow their children to go to the High School notwithstanding the fact that the building was heated and lighted and space made available for them?"

"I am a new councillor but I feel incumbent upon myself to say that in this City we have a system of separate schools. The fact that the Roman Catholic Episcopal Corporation approaches us with a plan of this kind proves it," said Councillor Nicholson.

Continuing Coun. Nicholson said if Roman Catholics want separate schools, then let's have it. We cannot help but know that Queen Square School and Rochford School are expressly for Roman Catholic pupils. I won't bury my head in the sand and say that separate schools do not exist. It is time we faced this situation, are we going to have separate schools or not?"

Councillor Nicholson said the school act does not provide for separate schools in the Province and if such are to exist, the Council must ask for legislation that will make separate schools possible. If we can have separate schools in Charlottetown, we can have them anywhere else in the Province," he said.

Stanfield-Hicks Debate Over Prospective Deficit Continues

HALIFAX (CP)—The controversy between Premier Robert L. Stanfield and former premier Henry D. Hicks over whether Nova Scotia's treasury is in the red this year continued Monday.

The New Progressive Conservative premier issued another statement reiterating that the province faces a large deficit for the fiscal year ending March 31.

He said, "There is no indication that revenues will exceed the estimates by more than a fraction of the prospective deficit." Earlier he suggested the deficit might be more than \$3,500,000.

Mr. Stanfield said the deficit for seven months to Oct. 31 "appears" to be \$2,194,000 compared with a surplus of \$1,255,000 for the comparable period in 1955.

For the 1955-56 fiscal year the province showed a \$1,177,000 surplus, he said. Because of 1956 expenditures made before Nov. 20, 1956, he predicted "the province this year will be some \$4,000,000 behind last year."

In a statement Sunday Mr. Hicks, a Liberal Opposition leader, said his administration exceeded estimates in some departments but the expenditures were covered by revenues, which were running ahead of expectations.

Mr. Hicks said no deficit was in sight when he turned the premiership over to Mr. Stanfield Nov. 20 after the Liberals were defeated in a provincial election Oct. 30.

It must be very embarrassing to Dr. Lea and the School Board to have us tell them how they should run their business. I cannot see why this gentlemen's agreement that has been in existence for the past eighty years cannot be continued."

Mayor Stewart said, Either we perpetuate the myth or we have a cleavage. They have such a system in Toronto. For my own part I would not want to see this system here. But I must point out that while it is the School Board's duty to build schools when needed, it is not their responsibility to the people to see that the school is un denominational.

Record Low Temperatures

Record low temperatures were experienced at Summerside Monday morning. The meteorological station of the R.C.A.F. station reported early in the morning that the temperature there registered 17.4 degrees below zero. This is the lowest temperature ever recorded since the meteorological unit was established at Summerside in 1946.

A temperature of 18 degrees below zero, recorded at the Experimental Fox Ranch was also a record low, which was one degree lower than the previous record low recorded on February 4, 1948. Some private thermometers are reported to have recorded even lower temperatures Monday morning.

Canada Enters Skating Ch'ships

OTTAWA (CP)—Canada will send all her champions among 13 skating disciplines to compete in the North American and world figure skating championships in the United States next month.

The North American meet will be held in Rochester, N.Y., Feb. 9-10 and the world championships are slated for Colorado Springs, Col., Feb. 26 to March 2nd.

F. Herbert Crispo of Toronto, president of the Canadian Figure Skating Association, said Monday in addition to the 13 Canadian competitors a Canadian referee and three judges will be at the North American meet and a Canadian referee and two judges at the world competition.

Leading the Canadian competitors are ladies singles champion Carole Jane Pachi of the Toronto Skating Club, men's singles titleholder Charles Snelting of Toronto, Ontario Granlie, pairs champions Barbara Wagner and Robert Paul of Toronto Skating and dance champions Linda and Jeffery Johnston of Ottawa's Minto Skating Club.

Miss Pachi, formerly of the Minto and Montreal Skating Clubs won the Canadian ladies crown in 1955-56 and represented this country in the last Olympics.

Snelting placed fourth in the world championships last year and has been Canadian champion for three years.

Bantam Champ Permitted To Have Another Match

SYDNEY, Australia (AP)—Peter Keenan, British and Empire Monday received permission from the British Boxing Board of Control to have another fight in Australia before returning home to defend his titles.
