Extending Atlantic Standard Time Zone

MONCTON, N. B., Sept. 23 - Insofar as train operations are concerned, the Canadian National Railways are extending Atlantic Standard time from Campbellton to Riviere Du Loup, effective with the changeover from daylight to standard time, Sunday, September 27th, and the inauguration of the fall and winter train services which are effective on the same date.

At the present time C. N. R. trains operate on eastern standard time from Campbellton west. Extra coaches MONCTON, N. B., Sept. 23 - Extra coaches are being attached to the morning train from Prince Edward Island on Saturday to accommodate a number of Girl Guides and Brownies from Sackville who are making the trip to Moncton in connection with the visit of the Chief Girl Guide, Lady Bawn-Powell.

It is expected there will be a total of 180 in the party.

Two Burned To Death In Moncton Fire

MONCTON, (CP) - Police recovered charred bones, believed to be those of two persons, from the fire ruins of a house in suburban Parkton late Thursday.

The bones are believed to be those of Mrs. Edward Saulnier and Edward Joseph Gallant, owner of the house destroyed Thursday morning.

Positive identification still was lacking but Gallant and Mrs. Saulnier have been missing since the fire started about 5 a.m. A.D.T.

Meanwhile, Mrs. Saulnier's husband, feared also to have died in the flames, turned up safely. Saulnier said he was out of town on business and first heard of the fire from a friend in Moncton about 10 a.m.

He saw he last saw his wife when he left home Wednesday noon. The Saulnier home is about a half-mile from the Gallant property.

"It's a terrible thing—a terrible thing. She's gone," Saulnier said tearfully of his wife.

A coroner's inquest was adjourned until next week. Earlier it was thought Saulnier had gone to the house with his wife and had also been trapped. There are six Saulnier children, the youngest a year old.

Fleet Air Arm Squadrons Arrive At S'side Station

The fleet's in, or at least the Fleet Air Arm, and the Canadian Navy is for the first time making its appearance as a regular part of the personnel at R. C. A. F. Station, Summerside. Two squadrons—No. 880 consisting of Avenger aircraft, a bomber type, carrying a normal crew of three and No. 870 with Sea Fury aircraft, a fighter type, a single passenger aircraft, arrived at Summerside on Sunday and Monday after returning from the Canadian National Exhibition and the National Air Show in Toronto.

Report Progress Towards Producing Polio Vaccine

By JOHN TRACY Canadian Press Staff Writer TORONTO, (CP) - Connaught medical research laboratories have reported progress in producing polio virus in quantity, a necessary step toward production of any polio vaccine.

Workers at the laboratories, part of the University of Toronto, have grown the dread virus in containers of almost two-quart size. Previously the virus had been grown in flasks in test tubes a little larger than a man's thumb.

No polio vaccine is yet available and scientists say that it will require extended trials before any vaccine which may be developed can be offered for use. The virus itself has to be turned out in quantity to facilitate further vaccine studies.

To produce a vaccine, the virus which causes the disease has to be killed or made harmless. The result, when injected into the body, can cause changes which will bring about destruction of the disease germs when they enter the body.

Dr. J.J. Enders of Harvard University had shown four years ago that polio virus could be grown on living tissue. Later research showed the virus could be grown on certain types of tissue from monkeys. But production of the virus was on the test-tube scale.

A year later Dr. R.C. Parker, working at Connaught laboratories on cancer research, produced a culture medium—a nutrient fluid for growing live cells.

Dr. Parker's medium, known as mixture No. 199, was used by the polio research group working under Dr. A.J. Rhodes.

Monkey kidney tissue, while still "alive," was chopped up and put in bottles of about two-quart capacity with mixture No. 199.

After the kidney tissue had been grown in the mixture for several days, polio virus was introduced and in growing destroyed the kidney-tissue cells.

To increase the yield of virus, members of the Toronto group, Dr. Leone Farrell and Dr. William Wood, devised a method of culturing, including the rotating of the containers while these were incubated in a room maintained at the temperature of the human body.

The work on polio at the Connaught laboratories is being conducted as part of a program of studies planned and supported by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, Inc. of New York—the March of Dimes.

Says Communists Have Strong Grip on Poland

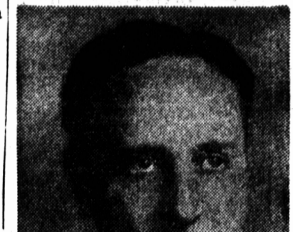
WASHINGTON, (AP) - The Polish United Nations delegate who fled to the free world says his country is so enslaved by Russian masters that any revolt "would be immediately drowned in blood" although only six or seven per cent of the people are Communists.

Dr. Marek Korowicz, former Krakow University professor, said Russian troops are stationed throughout Poland and all officers above lieutenant-colonel in the Polish army are actually Russians.

He testified Thursday before the United States House of Representatives un-American activities committee. NBC telecast the hearing.

The Voice of America and Radio Free Europe picked up the 50-year-old law professor's voice and broadcast behind the Iron Curtain his story of why he bolted from Poland's UN delegation and asked asylum in the U.S. "I knew it was only in the United States that I could serve to the fullest extent the interest of Poland."

Arctic Bishop Is Looking For Tough Clergymen

LIVERPOOL, Eng., (Reuters) - The bishop of the most extensive diocese in the world, Canada's Anglican diocese of the Arctic, arrived here Thursday looking for clergymen who can take it.

Rt. Rev. Donald Ben Marsh, 49, Bishop of the Arctic, said there is no room in his diocese "for the man who thinks he will be living on ice-cream and popcorn. The temperature in his northern diocese, which covers 2,750,000 square miles, drops as low as 70 degrees below zero."

Bishop Marsh, who was born in London, has been "taking it" for 27 years since he went to Canada as a missionary among the Eskimos. He now travels 40,000 miles a year in his diocese and gets home to his wife and three children in Toronto three times a year.

"We need about eight or nine clergymen and I am going to locate 100 times in the next two months to try to find them," Bishop Marsh said.

The bride's two little daughters, Rebecca, 8, and Yasmin, 3 1/2, sat on a divan while their mother and Haymes went through the ceremony in a hotel. The children kept turning their heads from the photographers back to the wedding ceremony almost as though watching a tennis match.

The wedding, staged by a press agent as if it were a scene out of one of Miss Hayworth's movies, was an hour late. This was due in part to the bride's nervousness in getting dressed and to the judge's tardiness because of a jury trial he was conducting downtown.

It was the fourth marriage for each. Haymes obtained a Nevada decree only Wednesday from Nora Eddington Flynn Haymes. She won a California decree last week. Rita was divorced from Moslem prince Aly Khan in Reno last January.

Rita went calmly through the ceremony until she answered with the traditional "I do." Then big tears came to her eyes and she started sobbing.

The ceremony was so brief it was over before the double ring part of the rite could be accomplished. Haymes got the ring on Rita's finger during the three-minute span, but after the wedding was over, hotelman Jack Emtratter fished out the ring that Rita was supposed to put on Haymes' finger. So she put it on anyway.

When her daughter Yasmin saw this, she yelled: "Mama, I want a ring, too."
