Glace Bay In 4-3 Victory Over Sydney

GLACE BAY, N.S., Nov. 18 — (CP) — Sydney Millionaires, last year the pride of Maritime hockey, were humbled 4-3 by Glace Bay Miners in a major league game here Saturday night. It was their fourth consecutive loss to Miners. More than 3,000 cash customers watched the locals in the best game played since the M.M.H.L. began. Miners outshot the visitors by a slim 30-28. Sydney now is far in the circuit cellar, three points behind Moncton and Halifax. Frank Bathgate of last year's Charlottetown Islanders picked up three points in smart trigger work for Millionaires and Pete Wywrot was outstanding for Miners. Elliot Chorley, Comet Bailey and John Anderson, as well as Wywrot were the Glace Bay scorers. Bill Cupolo, Bathgate, Dunc (Big Train) MacIntyre, did the honors for Sydney.

Millionaires were without the services of forward Skippy Frezell and defenceman Eddie Marneau, injured in last Friday's game against Miners.

On the ground floor, the fine hardwood floors long concealed under the roughening wear and tear of traffic, have regained their natural beauty after scrubbing and varnishing. These floors are of oak.

This week new furniture will be moved into place and aside from a little straightening up here and there the club will be ready for the winter.

Second of the executive's objectives is the rebuilding and strengthening of the club's membership. The canvass directed towards this end is meeting with very encouraging success and the membership now stands at 104, sixteen of whom are newcomers. Thus far the canvassers have called on only half the names on their lists, and there is reason to believe that when the drive is completed the Curling Club will have the largest membership in its history.

The women's division of the club will open the year's activities on Wednesday night, Nov. 22nd with a bridge party. By that date all the new furniture will have been delivered and with its newly decorated rooms, the club will be more attractive than it has ever been.

The executive seems well on its way to reaching its two objectives, a more attractive club, and a larger membership.

Athletic Union To Continue Empire Games Sponsorship

VANCOUVER, Nov. 18 — (CP)—The Amateur Athletic Union of Canada has decided to maintain the sponsorship of the British Empire Games committee.

After long debate delegates to the annual meeting here Friday night rejected a resolutions committee motion calling for an independent British Empire Games committee.

A later resolution called on the B. E. G. committee to formulate new rules which would make it a more continuing body with more control.

Len Walters, young feather-weight boxer from Vancouver, was named outstanding amateur athlete in Canada, when delegates awarded him the Norton H. Crews Memorial Trophy.

The Viscount Alexander Trophy for outstanding athletic achievement for 19 years and under went to Richard Ferguson, 19-year-old track star of Toronto.

A new trophy, the Tom Longboat Trophy for outstanding athletic achievement on the part of an Indian, was awarded to Frederick Baker of North Vancouver.

Candidates for the new trophy, named after the late track star, are picked by officials of the Indian Affairs Department in eight regions. Medals are awarded regionally and trophy winners are selected from the medal winners by the A.A.U.

In other resolutions the convention passed an amendment to the A.A.U. constitution will allow teachers and physical education instructors to participate in amateur sports if they are not receiving payment for coaching.

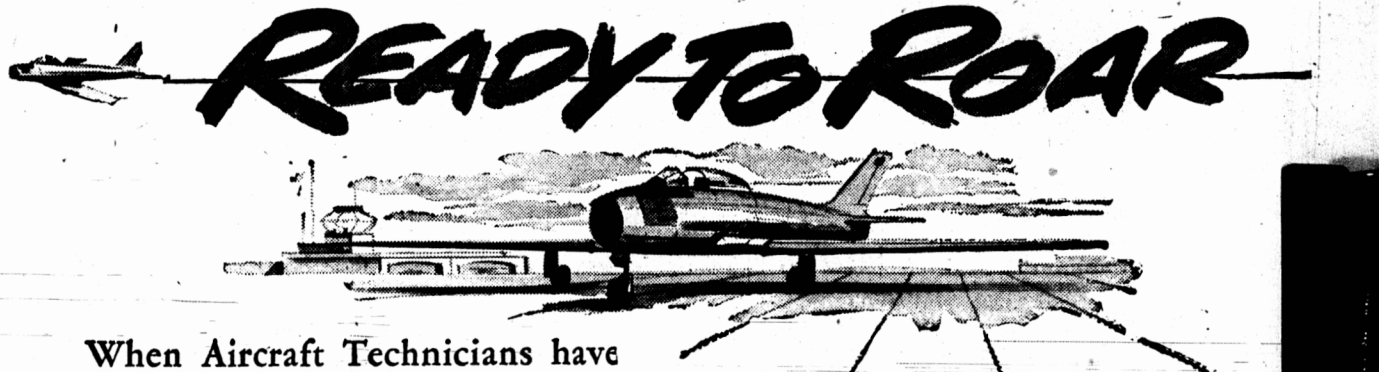
