Miss Helen Yeo has returned from New York, where she was attending for several weeks the 11th session of the U.N. commission on the Status of Women. This commission, elected by the Economic and Social Council, is made up of delegates from 18 member states. Although Canada is not at present a delegate, it is hoped that she will be elected to a seat at the next session of ECOSOC. In addition to the voting delegates, there was representation from ILO, UNESCO, and WHO, to give information from their organizations.

Present, also, were delegations from the non-governmental organizations (N.G.O.'s), including: I.F.B.P.W.; I.F.U.W.; W.Y.W.C.A.; W.C.W.; The Trade Unions and others. These N.G.O.'s have consultative status, with the privilege of speaking on topics being debated. Miss Yeo had a seat on the International Federation of Business and Professional Women delegation.

Battle Honors For 7 Regiments

OTTAWA (CP) — The army Tuesday announced Second World War battle honors to seven regiments covering the Sicilian, Italian and Northwest European campaigns.

Regiments: The Queen's Own Rifles of Canada, The Elgin Regiment (27th Armored Regiment); The Canadian Grenadier Guards (8th Battalion, The Canadian Guards); The Royal Hamilton Light Infantry (Wentworth Regiment); The Lincoln and Welland Regiment; Le Regiment de La Chaudiere and The Lake Superior Scottish Regiment (Motor).

The army last October issued a list of 169 battles, actions, engagements and theatres from which units might claim honors. Up to 10 may be emblazoned on unit colors.

Those which may be used on unit colors include: Grenadier Guards — Falaise Road, The Laison, Chambois, The Lower Maas, The Rhineland, The Hochwald, Veen, Twente Canal, Northwest Europe, 1944-45.

Chaudiere — Normandy landing, Carpiquet, Faubourg de Vaucelles, Falaise, Boulogne, 1944; The Rhineland, The Hochwald, Emmersch-Hoch Elten, Zutphen.

The following honors may also be claimed but not listed on the colors include: Grenadier Guards — Bad Zwischenahn.

Chaudiere — Cain, Bourgeois Ridge, The Laison, Chambois, Calais, 1944; Breskens Pocket, The Rhine, Northwest Europe, 1944-45.
