THE DREYFUS TRIAL

Defence Make a Move to Get at the Bottom of the Matter.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

RENNES, September 6.—The Court has decided to reject M. Laouri's application for an order upon the Government commissary to request the French Government to invite the foreign powers to supply the documents enumerated in the bordereau, on the ground that the Court did not consider itself competent to pronounce a judgment which might entail diplomatic action by the government.

In view of the rejection, the defence intend to issue subpoenas to Colonel Schwartz-Koppen and Panizzardi. The subpoenas will be transmitted by the Court through the Minister of War, the Minister of Justice and the Minister of Foreign Affairs, successively, and thence through the French Ambassador at Berlin and Rome.

Colonel Schwartz-Koppen and Panizzardi can select whether they will appear before the court martial or make depositions before magistrates in their respective countries.

Coming to Canada.

Cabinet Council on Friday—Great Activity at the Admiralty and War Offices.

MUCH ALARMED.

Lest the Proposed Canal Reduce Great Lakes Levels.

It is reported that the United States War Department has referred the protests of their Lake Carrier's Association against the construction of a canal through Kent county, Ontario, connecting Lake Saint Clair with Lake Erie, to Colonel Leydecker, with the request for a full investigation and a report. Colonel Leydecker will report both as to the probability that the project will find adequate financial support, and as to its effect upon the level of the lakes, should it be carried out. It seems probable that it is found that the Canadian project is being seriously considered with any prospect of its being actively entered upon in the near future, the State Department will take the matter up with the Canadian Government on the basis of a proposition to appoint a commission, which was earnestly advocated by Colonel Leydecker and his colleagues in the report on the Sault power canal.

MANUAL TRAINING SCHOOLS!

One to be Established in
Charlottetown

PROFESSOR ROBERTSON'S EX-
POSITION OF THE SCHEME

Success of the Movement in England,
Scotland and Elsewhere.

Professor Robertson, who may be called the herald of a new education, gave to his hearers yesterday afternoon, in the Y. M. C. A. hall a very interesting and important address. As had been announced, he spoke of the new system of manual training for children.

The Superintendent of education was appointed chairman. In a few words he introduced the speaker; and announced that he would present a scheme for the establishment of manual training schools throughout the separate provinces, in connection with the existing educational system.

The speaker began his address by mentioning that he was not to talk on government business, but merely as a private citizen, and solely in the interests of education.

The educational system of Canada, though bragged through the clouds, can be said to be improved;—and in a very happy manner. And it is the people of Canada that is to make her great, not the rich soil, nor the great wealth. By the education of the children we must reach the development we hope for. By beginning on the young, we have the better chance to secure a solution of the problem.

The speaker described the origin of the system of manual training he advocated. In 1890 it was begun in London by private enterprise for the purpose of instructing the children of artisans in the subjects it pertains to. The school authorities of that city could not use the public money for such an unauthorized purpose. But after it was tried and found a complete success, they supported it with money and personal effort. Now the boys are taught by competent teachers in the various branches of the work,—especially in wood, starting on the simplest ideas, and gradually learning the more difficult. A pupil spends half a day per week in obtaining this instruction; and about 40 are taught together, or 400 in the course of the week by one teacher, as there are ten half days in the week. There are 150 centres for manual training in London. Consequently there are about 40,000 pupils in attendance from the surrounding schools. In Manchester, 15,000 receive the same instruction. Liverpool, in addition to having schools of manual training, has schools for girls. The girls are taught sewing, washing, and ironing. As a result of this there was noticed a marked change even in the homes of the pupils. Throughout England and Scotland, there are over 4,000 of these schools and the number has been steadily increasing for the last ten years,—but more rapidly for the last three years.

The new method of education is praised by all who have come in contact with it. School Boards, Professors, and parents alike favor it. The leading men advocate its immediate introduction into schools where it does not already exist. They agree that the present book-study is one-sided, and leaves numerous faculties untrained; and they are unanimous in their opinion of its beneficial effect wherever established in England and Scotland.

Manual training is for children from the age of nine to twelve; and is not to be confounded with technical education. It does not prepare a child for a life's work; but trains his mind into certain lines of activity and truth.

The work done is solely the result of the child's own effort, and develops accuracy of observation of models from which he works. If assistance is needed from the teacher, he must not work upon the child the child has on hand, but upon another. This again instills into the mind of the pupil the love of truthfulness of work; for he does it all himself. He becomes self-reliant; and his work is a joy to him. It interests him, and his attention is concentrated on the work. The difficulties of the task yield to his perseverance. The progress of the development of the faculties of the child is the result of his own activity. His hand becomes the obedient servant of the brain, and his mental powers assume independence.

Though the work is well in itself, it is not in that respect alone that manual training is to be thought of. The spirit and ideas it leaves in the boy's mind are the best fruits of its excellence. It is more to develop his faculties than to make workman of him. But manual training is not a subject for a curriculum.
