

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

LONDON, Nov. 10. In the Commons, to-night, the debate on the closure question was resumed. Sir Stafford Northcote's motion—made on the Speaker's putting the first resolution of the closure rule on Monday night, that it be rejected—was defeated by 304 to 260.

The Parnellites voted for, and the other Irish members against the motion. During the debate five officers of the Indian Regiments engaged in the recent Egyptian campaign, appeared in the gallery of the House. They were greeted with cheers from the body of the House. The officers returned the salute. The scene was without precedent in the House.

DUBLIN, Nov. 10. At a meeting of the Corporation of Dublin, to-day, a heated discussion occurred on the motion to thank the Irish regiments who served in Egypt, for their gallantry, and to confer the freedom of the city on General Sir Garnet Wolseley. An amendment by Mr. Sullivan, declaring that Ireland had no interest in the war, the only result of which was to increase taxation and carry ruin to Irish homes, was ultimately carried by a vote of 27 to 21.

HONG KONG, Oct. 17. The ex-Regent of Corea Kun has been carried to perpetual captivity. Captain Long, of the British navy, has assumed his duties as organizer and director of the Chinese navy. His position is the same as that offered Commodore Shaufeldik.

CITY OF MEXICO, Nov. 10. The Tabasco Legislature has appointed Wenceslan Briseno provisional Governor of the State. NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 9—Midnight. New Orleans has been in darkness for two nights, owing to the failure of the city to pay their gas bills. The Times (Democrat) offers to pay the gas company the cost of lighting the city for five days, and call upon the citizens to meet and take measures to relieve themselves from their humiliating and dangerous situation.

LONDON, Nov. 10. The Standard says: "If the Republicans in the United States lay seriously to heart the plain lesson of Tuesday's elections, they will not, in the long run, have much reason to deplore the magnitude of the discomfiture in which the misconduct of their leaders has involved them. The result will certainly give an impetus to civil service reform. In that lies the hope of the future for honest men of all shades of political opinion, and the remedy for the evils which now deprave politics."

VIENNA, Nov. 10. There was no renewal of the rioting in the suburbs last evening, owing, probably, to the prevalence of a storm, but eight hundred men assembled in a western suburb. The president of the police has had a conference with the commander of the military to consider what measures should be taken to prevent riots in future. Many bills bearing the inscription "Down with the Jews" have been torn down by the police. Bills have been posted urging working people not to be intimidated by the soldiers.

LONDON, Nov. 10. The Daily News' Constantinople correspondent says England has informed the Porte that she does not consider the present a convenient moment for entering into negotiations relative to the Egyptian question, and that she cannot approve of the idea of sending a Turkish commissioner to Egypt during the continuance of Lord Dufferin's mission in that country.

The Daily News' Berlin correspondent says there is very little probability that a majority will be obtained from a union of conservatives and national liberals owing to objections of the latter to the alliance. The Times' Paris correspondent says certain powers have officially informed Great Britain that it would be impossible for them not to appear exacting if she granted any single nation an exceptional situation in Egypt. Great Britain, therefore, cannot grant France an exceptional position.

The sidewalk to which I allude is not only a disgrace to our City Fathers; but, to use a common expression, "a fright."
