TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

Trouble in Egypt.

LONDON, July 9. Uneasiness is felt in London because of the absence of news from Wady Halfa regarding Col. Woodhouse and his troops. The last report from him said he was following a superior force of dervishes. The Government is considering the advisability of sending reinforcements to him from Malta.

CAIRO, July 10.

Advices have been received here to-day that Col. Woodhouse's cavalry occupied the camp of the enemy and found it deserted by all except several men, women and children dying from thirst. No reinforcements for Woodhouse arrived at Aden last night. The dervishes occupied a position opposite the bank. A sharp engagement ensued. The dervishes were after water and managed to secure a supply, though many succumbed to the artillery and rifle fire of the Egyptians. There were several casualties among the Egyptians.

CAIRO, July 9.

Three battalions of British infantry and a squadron of Hussars have been ordered to Assouan.

Echoes of the Great Fight.

NEW ORLEANS, July 9.

John L. Sullivan, in an interview says, among other things, that he will never enter the ring again. He had done his share of fighting and wanted no more of it. His reference to Kilrain and his fighting qualifications were of a most pleasant character, concluding with the remark that he (Sullivan) had got more and more effective thumping in his late contest with Kilrain than ever in his life before. Sullivan says he will not accept Fox's belt either for his bulldog or himself, feeling that it is not necessary to establish the fact that he is the champion pugilist.

Anti-Jesuits Petition.

OTTAWA, July 9.

It is stated that the anti-Jesuits petition recently forwarded to the Imperial Government has been returned and the petitioners informed that the matter is wholly within the purview of the Canadian Government. A mass meeting of Anti's was held here this evening and addressed by Montreal orators.

Bad for the Whitecaps.

APPLETON, Wis., July 9.

August Belz was called to his door by a lot of Whitecaps last night, who attempted to flog him for alleged wife beating. Belz drew his bowie knife and slashed right and left, cutting a number of his assailants and giving one a fatal wound in the stomach. The Whitecaps fled with their wounded.

Shooting Affray.

BENECIA, Cal., July 9.

J. H. Winfield, son of the Methodist Bishop of California, was mortally shot here yesterday by J. E. Crooks in a quarrel over a newspaper article. Winfield struck Crooks in the face, when the latter drew a revolver and shot Winfield.

Off for the Old Country.

OTTAWA, July 9.

Messrs. McLeod and Gunn, the recently appointed Fisheries Commissioners, will leave by the Sardinian to-morrow. They will visit Yarmouth and other parts of the English coast before proceeding to Scotland and Holland.

Inspection of Cattle.

OTTAWA, July 9.

The Minister of Agriculture has under consideration the advisability of adopting measures for the prompt inspection of cattle and the quarantine of diseased cattle.

Petitioning the Vatican.

ROME, July 9.

A number of bishops and others have petitioned the Vatican to canonize Christopher Columbus on the anniversary of the discovery of America.

LONDON, July 9.

It is stated that the Delagoa Bay railway company will oppose arbitration.
