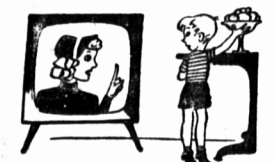

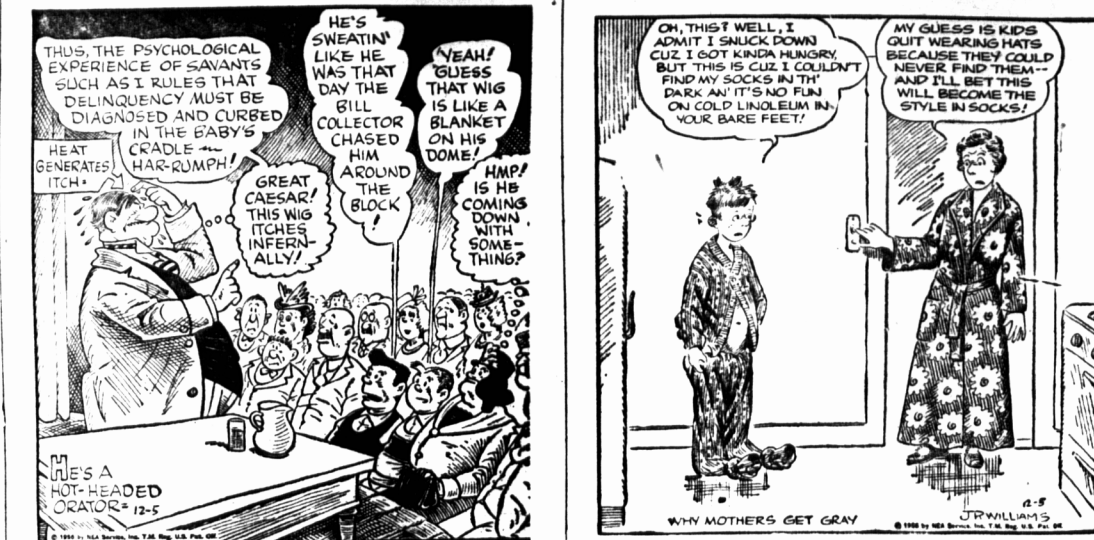

neat, logical style. East won the first two tricks with the king and ace of spades and continued with the jack of spades, which declarer trumped with the ten. West discarded a diamond. So South learned East had started with five spades.  
Declarer then played the king of hearts and a low one to the ace, both defenders following suit. South learned East had started with two hearts. This meant that East began his play with exactly seven cards in the major suits and hence six cards in the minor suits. Declarer now forced the issue by leading dummy's nine of hearts. East had to throw a spade. He could not afford a diamond, which would unguard his queen, or a club, which would permit declarer to tell the king by playing the ace and a small club.  
When East discarded the spade it left him with only one spade—the nine. Declarer stayed in dummy with the nine of hearts and played dummy's last spade. East played the spade nine, but South did not trump it. He discarded a club instead.  
East found himself in an unpleasant position. He had to return either a diamond or a club. Either play gave declarer his tenth trick. South lost three tricks — all spades.  
The entire operation went off so smoothly that, in effect, declarer made ten tricks without a finesse.

**Nehru Sees Dangerous Vacuum Created In The Middle East**

New Delhi Reuters — Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru said Monday a dangerous vacuum had been created in the Middle East that could easily bring "a drift to war."  
Nehru told the upper house of Parliament that British influence in the area has "greatly lessened, to say the least of it." One of the most important questions, he added, is who would fill the vacuum.  
Nehru said the situation both in the Middle East and Hungary could well produce a major war.  
"We should not take steps which involve sudden humiliation of any country," he said.  
"The world, he added, has returned to the "concept of cold war in its most intense form."  
On Soviet Premier Nikolai Bulganin's proposal for a big-power conference, including India, to end the arms race, Nehru said: "We have to lessen tensions before we sit down and talk about disarmament."  
"The Middle East vacuum is a major source of tension," he said. "Vacuums have been created in the Middle East and are being created," he said. "A power vacuum cannot exist for long and there is rivalry as to whom will succeed in filling it."  
The situation in the world to-  
day, Nehru declared, shows the weaknesses and futility of military pacts and alliances.  
The prime minister said the five-nation Baghdad pact, of which India is not a member, had undergone a strange transformation and it had been suggested it should become a Moslem bloc.  
**SPLIT STATES**  
He said:  
"It is even hinted that the United States should join it — as a leading Moslem power I suppose. I should imagine the United States is not happy at being dragged into this peculiar position."  
"The first result of the Baghdad pact has been to split the Moslem states, serving almost as an invitation to Russia to take a greater interest in the Middle East."  
Nehru said the Hungarian government's breach of promise for safe conduct for ousted premier Imre Nagy was "a very serious matter."  
The prime minister said the people of Hungary should be allowed to fashion their own destiny and all foreign troops should be withdrawn. "The policy may have to be phased but it should be done with fair speed," he said.

**Forecasts Hike In Price Of Sugar**

**MONTREAL CP**—A one or two-cent increase in retail sugar prices was foreseen here Friday as a result of a recent rise in sugar future quotations on world commodity exchanges.  
Sugar retails in Montreal at 13 to 14 cents a pound.  
The rise was traced by brokers to heavy European buying as a result of the Middle East situation. Heavy buying—60,000 tons—by British interests has been reported.
