# Conference Sends Hopes Soaring For Early Peace In Indo-China

## Rebels In Guatemala Appear Bugged Down For Lack Of Transportation

TEGUCIGALPA, Honduras (AP)—The leader of Guatemala's rebels said Wednesday he is ready for a long or short fight to topple the government. But his troops appeared bugged down for lack of transportation.

The broad-based Puerto Barrios, Guatemala's important seaport on the Atlantic, is isolated by the rebels and its transportation facilities are cut.

BERN, Switzerland, (Reuters)—A "cordial" two-hour talk Wednesday between Premiers Pierre Mendes-France of France and Chou En-lai of Communist China sent hopes soaring for an early peace in Indo-China.

Mendes-France told reporters that he wanted to "sound a note of optimism" after the meeting. He predicted "real progress" in Indo-China peace talks at the Geneva Far East conference.

## INCREASED TEMPO

This move, and the optimism of the official statements, was seen likely to increase the tempo of future nine-power Indo-China negotiations at Geneva.

## QUESTIONS UNANSWERED

Chou had been expected to raise the question of French recognition for Communist China at the meeting. Both Mendes-France and Chinese spokesmen insisted the two leaders talked only of Indo-China.
