NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—Is the one sided preference making you rich?

—A correspondent at Alberton sends us a lengthy and interesting account of the recent visit there, of the flotilla under Vice Admiral Larkin. But exhibition and other matter has crowded it out.

—Premier Farquharson now says that "to be without an exhibition is a calamity!" Yes, an exhibition is an educator of the people;—and not to have an exhibition for two or three years is, it appears, an educator of politicians.

—The Guardian this morning states that there is a difference between the way they do things here and in Great Britain. It says that over there the chief Liberal whip publicly admits that he expects his party to be beaten at the elections, but that here both the leaders are sure of a coming victory. Now, why does not the Guardian, if it approves of the English plan, come out like a man and admit defeat for its party.

—Attention is directed to the card of Mr. John P. Brennan who has a large new warehouse at North Sydney in which to store farm products, etc. The want of such a warehouse was felt at Sydney. Recently, we hear, hay, oats, etc. were lying there on the wharf out in the heavy rains of the season. Mr. Brennan understands the P. E. Island trade, and products consigned to him will without doubt, receive careful attention.

—Another good meeting of the Tupper Club was held last evening, Mr. J. B. Dawson in the chair. The speakers included Mr. A A McLean, Q C, Mr. R B Norton, Mr. W S Stewart, (our candidate), Mr. Manson, Mr. John Bradley, of Killys Cross, and others.

Mr. Stewart reported encouragingly from some of the country districts he had visited. He found a great deal of disappointment and dissatisfaction among the people on account of the failure of the Government leaders (including Sir Louis Davies) to fulfill their pre-election promises and on account of the high price of binder twine, kerosene oil and other necessities, all of which the farmers were led to believe would be lower in price when the Liberal leaders reached office.

Mr. John Bradley reviewed the Liberals record pretty thoroughly, very correctly, and with a wit that is inimitable.

It is very pleasing to note that intelligent farmers in the country keep a close watch upon the powers that be, and are independent enough to condemn them when they do wrong.
