America's Wheat Crop.

GREAT BRITAIN'S REQUIREMENTS AND THE EAST INDIA SUPPLY.

Enough is now definitely known to correctly estimate the wheat crop of America, that is, of the United States and Canada, for this year.

The people of the United Kingdom consume an average of 5 1/2 bushels of wheat per head per annum and putting the population at 37 1/2 millions, the wheat required to feed the Britishers the coming year amounts to 206 1/2 millions of bushels.
