

Conservative Candidates Are Nominated In Fourth Prince

SUMMERSIDE — Mr. E.H. Strong was nominated as councillor and R.A. Profit as assemblyman to contest the 4th district of Prince of Wales in the Progressive Conservative Party election at a convention held last evening in the Kensington High School auditorium. The district association president, John Green, presided.

Mr. Strong's nomination was moved by Ernest Mill and seconded by Vernon McCarville, while Mr. Profit's nomination was moved by Harry Dawson and seconded by Gerald Best. Competing against Mr. Strong for the councillor nomination was Oliver Campbell, Kensington whose nomination was moved by Dr. L. K. Zielenki and seconded by James Hamill.

Three names were put forward for the assemblyman nomination, Mr. Profit winning out over Layton Green, Albany and Keith Boswell, Victoria. Mover and second for Mr. Green were Claude Delaney and Eric Jesperson, while Bennett Deignan and Ernest Mill were mover and second for Mr. Boswell.

Before the nomination convention commenced John Green was re-elected president of the 4th district, while Leigh Campbell was re-elected vice-president. Vernon McCarville was elected secretary.

Seated on the platform, all of whom addressed the convention briefly, were Dr. O.H. Phillips, M.P., W.R. Shaw, provincial leader of the P.C. party, Frank Beyer, M.L.A., Mr. Henry Wedge and Dr. H.B. MacNeill.

Always Had Hope, Wife Says As Husband Found

SPRINGHILL, N.S. (CP)—Mrs. Rose Kempf said she never gave up hope her husband would come out of the mine alive.

It was Rose Kempf's voice through an airline that brought the first word that 12 men were still alive after almost six days underground in shattered No. 2 colliery.

"I never lost faith," she said at home where, with relatives, she had waited for news of efforts by rescue workers to reach miners trapped at the 13,000-foot level of the mine where a giant upheaval last Thursday trapped 174 men.

"I kept thinking of the things we would do when he got home. When I spoke that way my relatives looked at me strangely."

MAY NOT GO BACK
She said she doesn't think her husband will go back to mining. "Our children—Billy, 16, and Betty, 15—are pretty nearly grown up now and there's no need to take a second chance."

The night before Billy Kempf had stood in an office near the mine and said: "Ma ain't given up hope yet."

He was starting at the floor and then he looked up and added, "and neither have I."

"Dad's come out of there for 17 years. He's been hurt before," Sharon Holloway, 11-year-old daughter of Joseph Holloway Jr., said she gave up hope but her mother didn't.

"My daddy will never go back into the mine again. I know that. He won't get in unless it's over my dead body."

TRAPPED ONCE BEFORE
Once before her father had had a brush with death. In 1956 he was trapped in adjoining No. 4 colliery when an explosion caught 47 men. He came up with 38 survivors 2½ days later. But he didn't give up coal mining then.

Mrs. Margaret Michniak, wife of Theodore Michniak, one of the 12 found alive, said: "I prayed he'd come back. I prayed he'd come back to me. God has sent him."

Like other relatives of survivors, she vowed her 59-year-old husband would never go back to mining. She also has three miner sons.

"I don't want him to go back and I'm sure he won't. They should put up factories for our men to work in."

The Michniaks have been married 32 years. Mr. Michniak came to Canada as a Polish immigrant. Two of their sons work in a salt mine near Detroit, the third in a Cape Breton coal mine.

Mrs. Art Totten, mother-in-law of Joseph Holloway Jr., and Hugh Guthro, another of the survivors, didn't let her heart condition stop her when she heard the news.

RAN ALL THE WAY
Doug Bennett, Canadian Press correspondent who was at Mrs. Totten's house when the word came, said she ran out of the house as fast as she could and sprinted the quarter-mile to the mine.
