**Household Hints.**

An Excellent Poultice for Rheumatism or Acute Pains.—A teaspoonful of cayenne pepper, two teaspoonfuls of mustard, and four tablespoonfuls of flaxseed meal. Mix with boiling water.

Chapped Hands.—An ounce each of spermaceti, white beeswax, gum camphor, and two ounces of almond oil. Put in a tin cup, place in a vessel of boiling water, and melt. Every time the hands are wet rub a little of this over them.

Neuralgia.—An old lady writes to the Tribune that she has suffered much from this distressing complaint, and has received great relief from taking three or four drops of red lavender in a little water, or on a lump of sugar, two or three times a day.

Sore Mouth from Calomel, etc.—An infusion of low-blackberry leaves, sweetened with honey. Moisten frequently.

For Canker'd Sore Mouth.—Pulverize equal parts of borax and sugar to very fine powder; take up a little upon the point of a penknife, and blow it into the mouth of a nursing child.

For a Scald from Steam or Water.—Moisten the spot with water or milk, and apply fine salt, as much as will adhere. This will usually prevent a blister.

Cure for Gravel.—Sweeten your tea with honey and sugar in equal parts. Never has been known to fail. If possible, secure honey made from clover-blossoms instead of wild flowers and buckwheat.

Instantaneous Emetic.—Two teaspoonfuls mustard mixed in warm water.—For a child with croup it relieves at once. A tablespoonful of lard, warmed and given, is an instantaneous emetic.

Cure for Fever and Ague.—An ounce of Peruvian bark, pulverized, half an ounce of cream of tartar, half an ounce of cloves; bottle with port wine. Take a teaspoonful three times a day, or a little more if the stomach will bear it. Take daily when not suffering from an attack.

Corn Oysters.—Grate one dozen ears of sweet corn, beat three eggs light and add to the grated corn; two tablespoonfuls of milk, salt, and very little flour to make a batter. Drop by the spoonful in hot lard, and fry.

Treatment of Itch.—The Prussian military authorities cure itch by smearing the parts with a mixture of two parts of liquid storax, with one part of sweet oil. The cure is said to be complete in twenty-four hours.

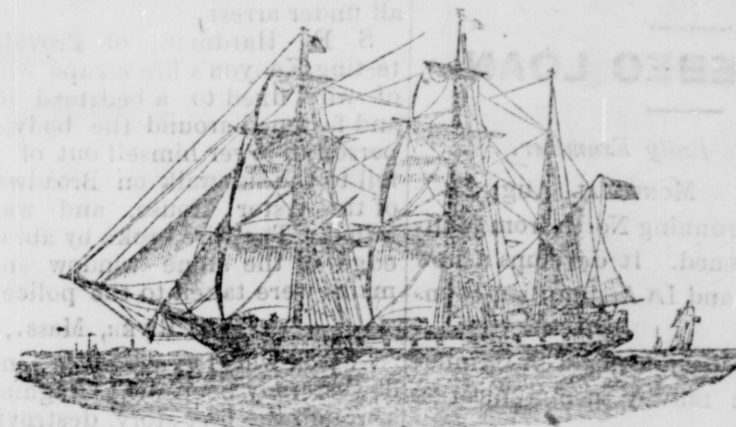
