

# Schools and Fails in town

Prince Edward Island tourism topped all those in other Canadian provinces in the collection of the June set-aside with 99.3 per cent collected of the amount for the day-trippers across Canada contribute each June to a national advertising fund for their product. Secretary J. W. Lincoln Devlar told the annual meeting of the P.E.I. Day-trippers Association here yesterday.

Dairy plant operators across the province were given full credit for "excellent co-operation" in the collection of this amount, and also for the annual assessment of \$4,500 voted by dairymen at their last annual meeting.

A disappointing result was reported by the effort to get milk into Charlottetown schools.

Milk has been made available in Montague and Alberton schools by dairy plants in the area but, he said, the effort involving "an attempt to have the plant operators in Charlottetown undertake the responsibility of supplying individual schools with no particular success."

Milk was put in the Sherwood school for the first time in the federal department of health loaned a dispenser, he reported. "That was a very important step should be exercised in marketing dairy products in Nova Scotia."

The centennial celebration will be heralded by a tour of the province from the standpoint of future tourist development, he said.

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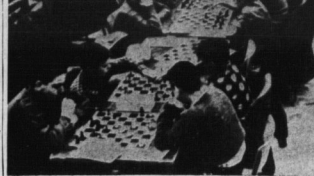

It was charged by Mr. Matheson that the minister, Hon. Leo Rossiter, "directly advanced" the North Rust Canning Company \$14,000 for stock.

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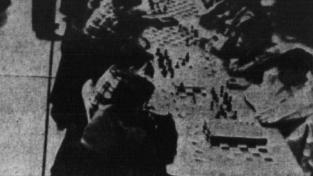
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## Lions Setting Stage For 1964 Convention
