Kings County Highways Being Cleared Of Snow

Highways in Kings County are being dug out following a week-end storm which to all effects stopped all traffic throughout the area. The storm, which began on Saturday afternoon, closed all the secondary routes by early Sunday morning and a short time later all main traffic routes were closed. People who were travelling to spend the Christmas week-end were snowbound and were unable to reach their destination a day later when some of the routes were opened.

Yesterday the main highway between Charlottetown and Montague was opened and cars and trucks were using the road to get people to their work in other localities. A few of the other roads were worked early yesterday but plowmen said that it was filling in behind the plow almost as quickly as the road was cleared owing to a strong grounddrift.

At New Perth and Summersville there were huge banks of snow where after a few more storms like this past one, the plows will run into considerable difficulty clearing the roadway. Late last night the plows were still working trying to clear as many routes as possible and with the abating of the storm last night they expect to get all main routes open today.
