## Special Exhibition Is Showing At Centre

A special exhibition of the latest work by two Charlottetown artists and a ceramicist opened Tuesday night to a sizeable audience at Confederation Centre. A reception was tendered by the Women's Committee of the Gallery prior to the official opening.

The artists are James Little, curator and artist-in-residence at Confederation Centre, and Henry Purdy, a painter-sculptor who also teaches commercial art at the Provincial Vocational Institute. The ceramicist is James Shaw who for the last year has been instructing Island craftsmen and women in pottery making.

Mr. Shaw will leave the province shortly to accept a position in New Brunswick.

Mr. Little, a native of Calgary, is represented by 15 water-colours, oils and drawings, several of which have been loaned by private collections. Perhaps the most striking work is a study of a Slavey Indian woman owned by the Glenbow Foundation of Calgary.

Included as well are two recent oils, one a study of the artist's wife, and the other a "View of St. Dunstan's Basilica", a striking study in vivid colours.

Mr. Purdy is represented in the exhibition by 25 paintings and eight of his welded metal sculptures. The paintings display three distinct lines of approach in rendering subject matter, and most are done with fast drying plastic paint. The sculptures are fascinating exercises in form and are extremely effective.

Mr. Shaw has contributed 15 ceramics, most of them decorated bowls, jars and vases in stoneware and earthenware.

Most of the works on display may be purchased by negotiating with the individual artists.

The exhibition will be on view to the public during regular gallery hours along with a superb collection of landscapes by the British masters, "The Massey Collection".

## Town Council Holds Meeting

GEORGETOWN — The regular monthly meeting of the Georgetown Town Council was held in the Council Chambers Monday night, with Mayor Howard S. MacLean presiding and Councillors Lavers, Currie and MacDonald in attendance.

Councillor Lavers presented the financial statement for the month of September on both ordinary account and capital account. Bills amounting to \$81.68 on ordinary account were approved for payment and in capital account, bills amounting to \$2,415.77 were approved for payment.

Councillor Currie, Chairman of the Welfare and Street Light Committee reported that there were no applications for welfare relief and no requests for additional street lights. more interest in the question than himself, since the charges were levelled at him.

But the charges amounted to "slandorous insinuation."

They should be dealt with in the "proper forum"—the defence committee—where they could be considered in relation to other relevant facts.

**SAYS 'OLD TORY GAME'** — The special debate was being sought only to delay the regular business of the House. "It's an old Tory game and some of us are getting a little tired of it."

Mr. Nugent said this was imputing an untrue motive to his action. He had been careful in his investigation and was sure of his facts before he acted.

"It may be unimportant to the minister whether he tells the truth . . ." he started, before being cut off by the Speaker.

There were hoots and catcalls from opposition benches over the suggestion that the aim of the motion was to delay debate on medicare.

Stanley Knowles (NDP—Winnipeg North Centre) said the Liberals had first come out for medicare 47 years ago. "What hasn't taken place in 47 years isn't going to be handled in 45 minutes," he said in reference to the short Wednesday sitting.

Mr. Nugent drew support from Michael Forrestall (PC—Halifax), who said he associated himself with the charges.

When Mr. Hellyer said the charges were slandering, Mr. Forrestall shouted: "They're true." He asked that Mr. Hellyer withdraw the word slandering but Mr. Hellyer refused.

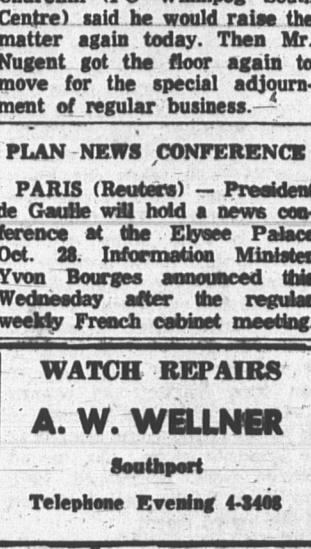
He was taken to the Prince County Hospital in Summerside where he was reported on the critical list.
