The Indian River-Kensington Dramatic Club presented the three act comedy, "When Irish Eyes Are Smiling", to a large and appreciative audience in the King George Hall last night. This play is a heart-warming drama replete with laughter and tears.

The cast included several former stage favorites and they were ably supported by some talented newcomers to a Kensington stage.

The scene is set around the home of Pat Gerahy, who has suffered an accident and is obliged to propel himself about in a wheel chair. The part of "Pat" is capably taken by Tom Turner. His ward and faithful companion and nurse, "Eileen O'Shawn", is true to her first love, Pat's son "Bob" during the ten years of his absence and is re-united with him when he returns a famous actor and singer. The parts of "Bob" and "Eileen" are realistically portrayed by Alfred McQuaid and Mary Cameron.

"Mrs. Mulrooney," Pat's housekeeper, a motherly Irish woman who tries to manage everyone, especially her daughter "Mary", is a part full of pathos and comedy interpreted by that versatile veteran of the stage, Mrs. L. G. Ramsay, C.D.A.

Her charming daughter "Mary" finds out in time that "Jimmie Duggan" is the only man for her. "Mary" and "Jimmie" are shorter parts assigned to Agatha McLeellan and Justin Reid who turn in a good performance.

"Mrs. Feinberg", the owner of Pat's boarding house, is a short but difficult part well taken by Mrs. Justin McLeellan.

Just as every play has its villain it must have its policeman and this time the big tender-hearted Irish cop "Tim Casey" is cleverly acted by Sydney Heckbert, while the unpopular part of the villain, "Harry Riner", is equally well taken by Eddie Pendergast.

Miss Hazel Hughes, as "Lou", Harry's girl, shows very convincingly that she has no heart for his shady deals. Miss Helen McDonald as "Mamie", an ambitious playwright, brings good fortune to all when her show is accepted and the play ends on a happy note as the curtain falls on the re-united lovers. Specialties between the acts were instrumental music by Peter Perry, Emile Gauthier and Yvonne Arsenault; vocal solos by Miss Helen McDonald, Miss Elizabeth Brooks and Regie Pendergast, and dancing by the ever popular little Miss Myrtle Perry. The play will be repeated tonight.

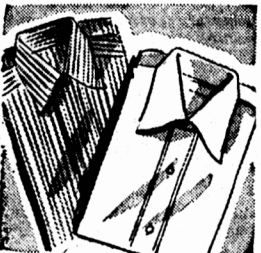
