

Says Canada Is Neglecting Armed Services For Air

ORILLIA, Ont. (CP)—A retired Canadian Army general said Wednesday Canada is neglecting her armed service while following United States defence policy in emphasizing air power.

Gen. W. H. S. Macklin, retired army adjutant-general, made his statements in an address to the 25th Lake Couchiching Conference, jointly sponsored by the CBC and the Canadian Institute of Public Affairs, and in answer to questions.

Citing neglect of the army, Gen. Macklin said thousands of men—many of them from prisons—recruited into the Canadian Army for service in Korea never fought or did a day's work.

(Policy for recruiting the 25th Canadian Infantry Brigade, Canada's original Korea force, was laid down by then Defence Minister Claxton. Gen. Macklin, as adjutant-general at the time, was responsible for implementing it.)

FEARS HANDLING

Gen. Macklin said Canada's armed services are designed along lines laid down by "some of the wilder U.S. armmen and their deluded supporters... good for nuclear war and nothing else."

The services were unable to cope with smaller wars that are cropping up all over the lot.

He added:

"I would never suggest that adoption of this strategy in the first place was wrong. It had to be adopted when Russia exploded a nuclear weapon seven years ago."

"It was the handling of this awesome strategy that I gravely fear... may drag us to our ruin."

Gen. Macklin said the Canadian Army is 11 years behind in its equipment and has an airborne brigade without aircraft to lift it.

The Canadian field army, comprising 1.3 divisions, was still armed and equipped substantially on the 1945 model.

"I should like to point out that the army has waited patiently and impotently for 10 solid years for its transport and supply by air, while every resource of our jet aircraft industry has been devoted to designing and building jet interceptors and nothing else."

Canada had hitched her defence wagon to a United States "thermonuclear star" and had left herself without any other military means of practical use.

Lauds Enthusiasm Shown In C.W.A.C. Training Camp

NIAGARA-ON-THE-LAKE, Ont. (CP)—A summer camp of 250 women soldiers has established that the fair sex "should never have been allowed out of the army," say staff officers here.

MaJ. William Teskey, recalling the job thousands of girls did for Canada while serving in the Canadian Women's Army Corps during the Second World War, says this camp for girls carrying on the tradition in the reserve army is keeping the record intact.

"They're doing a wonderful job," he said. "We ought to have more of them in the army right now."

Brig. G. E. R. Smith, who commands the army's central Ontario area and is commandant of this 14-day camp just outside this quiet village near Niagara Falls, said the enthusiasm and ability of CWACs here as astonished the instructors, regular army officers who had never taught women before.

USEFUL TRAINING

The CWAC camp, commanded by Capt. Eunice Arnold of Oakville, is one of five in Canada this year. The women, from 29 Ontario centres in Central Canada, are in their second and last week of officers', junior and senior NCO courses and basic training.

The girls' camp pay ranges from \$50 for privates to \$150 for officers. The day starts at 6 a.m. After breakfast there are lectures and drills until 11:30 when operations stop for lunch. At 1:30 p.m. classes resume until 4:30.

Lieut. J. R. Fowle of Ottawa, who teaches the junior NCOs, said:

"No one expected them to do the job they are doing. I found I didn't have to use any tricks to get their attention—they had a real desire to learn."

Lieut. J. R. Maclean of Brockville, formerly of Calgary, said he almost prefers to teach military law to the women than to the men.

"It's normally considered a dull subject. But the girls' enthusiasm and inquisitiveness have made it interesting."

HOME AT CAMP

The women, whose average age is 26, live in tents with grass floors and two army-cot beds. Officers have a bureau.

Showers and ablution rooms, each with an electric washing machine, are in separate tents. All have electric lighting. Officers have their own mess. Other ranks

are together. The women soldiers find tent guy wires excellent for hanging out lingerie. The women wear lipstick and curl their hair at shoulder-length but Brig. Smith said they could give a good account of themselves with a rifle if need be.

In the evenings the girls are left on their own. Allowed out within a radius of 20 miles until 11 p.m. week nights and 1 a.m. Saturdays, some visit the village, some go to the United States nearby and others remain in camp for a good night's sleep.

LEARN DISCIPLINE

Said Pte. Theresa Orifice, 20, of Ottawa:

"If you don't get to bed early you feel the next morning on the parade square, by goodness. The army has taught me discipline and as soon as my two sisters are 18 I'm going to try to persuade them to join."

Three quarters of the women in camp here are married, many to army men.

Most of the women, who work at various types of jobs during the day, said they joined the militia for something to do. Parades are held two evenings a week in their hometowns.

After a few months' training, however, they felt the service was more than just a time-filler. It was preparing them for action should the country be threatened.

English Attorney-General To Tour N. America

LIVERPOOL, England (CP)—Attorney-General Sir Reginald Manningham-Buller sailed Wednesday for Montreal for a month-long tour of Canada and the United States.

Main purpose of his Canadian visit is the meeting Sept. 2 to 11 in Montreal of the Canadian Bar Association. While there, he will receive a degree of Doctor of Civil Law from McGill University. He will address the bar association banquet Sept. 7.

The attorney-general arrives in Montreal Aug. 14 and leaves immediately for Banff, Alta. He also will visit Vancouver and Victoria. From Aug. 21-31 he will tour the U.S.
