# White Sox Aim To End Shame Of 1919 Scandal

NEW YORK (AP)—Eddie Cicotte, star right-hander for Chicago White Sox, wound up and made his first pitch of the 1919 world series against Cincinnati Reds, champions of the National League.

The ball hit Maurice Rath, Cincinnati second baseman, and lead off batter.

That hit batsman, on Oct. 1, 1919, in the first game of the series at Cincinnati was the tipoff that the fix was in for what later was called the "most gigantic sports swindle in the history of America."

When this year's series opens in Chicago next week the current White Sox aim to end the shame of that Black Sox scandal of 40 years ago.

**AGREED THROW IT**

In 1919, the White Sox were acclaimed as the greatest baseball team ever, but eight of their star players agreed to throw the series to the Reds for a reported \$100,000 in a plot with sure-thing gamblers.

There were rumors that something was up when the Reds won the best-of-nine series, five games to three, but it was not until nearly a year later that the scandal became public knowledge.

Involved, in addition to Cicotte, masteer of the shine ball, were outfielder Shoeless Joe Jackson, perhaps the most natural hitter of all time; first baseman Buck Weaver; shortstop Swede Rickard; outfielder Oscar Chick Gandil; southpaw pitcher Claude Williams; and utility infielder Fred McMullin.

The news broke September 28, 1920, when the late Charles Dinkley, Associated Press sports writer in Chicago, persuaded a Chicago judge to recess a divorce case and confirm that the players had confessed to a grand jury.

**CONFIRMED CONFESSIONS**

Judge Charles McDonald, to whom the grand jury had returned its findings, confirmed the confessions and told how Cicotte described plays that "threw the games."

The scandal led to the appointment of Kenesaw Mountain Landis as baseball's first commissioner.

The players were acquitted at their trial in August, 1921, but Landis banished all of them from baseball.

Testimony at the trial disclosed that the players were double-crossed by the gamblers and received only \$47,000 instead of \$100,000.

**MASTER MIND**

Arnold Rothstein, New York gambler who was shot to death in 1928, was reported to be the master mind behind the fix.

Chicago, with Cicotte pitching, lost the first game of the series to the Reds 9-1. The Sox also lost the second game, 4-2, with Williams on the mound.

Southpaw Dickie Kerr, one of the Chicago players not involved, blanked the Reds 3-0 in the third game; Cicotte lost the fourth game 2-0 and Williams the fifth 5-0. The Sox won the sixth game 4-1 behind Kerr and the seventh 4-1 behind Cicotte. The Reds walked Williams and the Sox 10-5 in the deciding eighth game.

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# Argos Swamp Als 39-9; Tiger-Cats Defeat Riders

A new quarterback and a new coach seems to have shot life into the slumping Toronto Argonauts of the Big Four Football League.

The new quarterback, Al Dorow, acquired only last Wednesday in a trade with British Columbia Lions of the Western Interprovincial League, sparked the Argos to a spectacular 39-9 upset over Montreal Alouettes.

Dorow fired four touchdown passes as the new coach, Steve Owen, beamed.

Meanwhile, upstart Ottawa Rough Riders were defeated by league-leading Hamilton Tiger-Cats 23-14 in the other league action Saturday.

to the three losses to Coyle, one of Oklahoma State's stars in last season's Orange Bowl game. Dorow also scored a touchdown himself and the other touchdowns were converted by Gilchrist.

Veryl Switzer crashed over from one yard out for Montreal's lone touchdown and Johnny Blachere converted it. Quarterback Sam Echeverry accounted for the Als' two other points on punts.

Dorow, who at first just handled the kicking for Argos, took over directing the attack from homebrew Gerry Doucette late in the second quarter after the Als had taken a 2-0 lead.

Owen, the team's defensive coach before getting the head coaching job, made some slight adjustments in the Argos lineup and the moves paid off. Cleve Wester was switched from defensive end to guard to strengthen the interior of the line and in another change Coyle, previously used mainly on defence, played both ways and scored Argos' first three touchdowns.

Dorow completed 10 of 16 passes and Dugette two of six for a total of 275 yards. The Alouettes, with Echeverry throwing all but a couple of their passes, tried 35 and completed 23 for 316 yards and had three interceptions. Argos had a 189-142 edge along the ground, but Alouettes piled up more first downs, 26-20.

**TIGERS LEAD**
