Conference To Hear Allied Youth Official

The keynote address to delegates attending the third provincial conference on the alcohol problem, being held at the Radisson Recreation Centre, April 2 and 3, will be delivered by Dr. Thomas Skipp, Washington, D.C.

Dr. Skipp, chairman of the board of trustees of Allied Youth, will be heard prior to the official opening Thursday afternoon at which Education Minister Dewar will preside.

The conference will start Thursday morning with addresses by director of alcohol studies David M. Bassett, Charlottetown, and by city and county officials and an address by Rev. Henry Hart, St. John's.

Other highlights of the first day will be presentation of a shield to the province's best Allied Youth Post and an evening talk by Michael Hennessy, registrar of St. Dunstan's University.

Speakers to be heard on Friday the final day include Keiter Ellinwood, of New York, author, lecturer, youth worker and counsellor for alcoholics; Rev. Arthur Pendergast, of Seven Mile Bay Parish, and Mr. Ross.

Other features of the day will include a question and answer period, talks by candidates for provincial allied youth office election of officers, discussion groups and a youth panel with Mr. Helen McDonald as moderator.

No definite figures on the number of delegates expected are yet available. High schools with allied youth posts will be allowed five delegates each while other high schools will be limited to three. All delegates must be at least 15 years of age.
