

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

EUROPEAN.

LONDON, Oct. 22.
A terrific hurricane passed over Denmark on Wednesday, doing much damage to shipping at Copenhagen.

MADRID, Oct. 22.
The ceremony of churcing the Queen took place at the Palace Royal yesterday in the presence of a brilliant assemblage. There was an immense crowd within and outside the chapel.

NEW YORK, Oct. 22.
Mexican advices state that a bill has passed the Senate authorizing the American troops to cross the border in pursuit of the Indians. Congress has also granted a concession to Lorillard's archeological researches.

LONDON, Oct. 22.
British steamer Laieham, on the voyage from New York to London, lost all the cattle off her deck, and had her cargo shifted.

ROME, Oct. 22.
The distinguished German authoress, Eliza Linhardt, suicided at Civita Vecchia, by drowning.

BERLIN, Oct. 22.
Prince Hohenlohe is regaining his health. He expects to resume his duties in a fortnight.

CETTINGE, Oct. 22.
The Turkish Commissioner, notwithstanding his promises to return, although the weather has greatly moderated has not yet appeared at Rijeka.

NUOVO, Oct. 22.
Prince Nikata has invited all the leading men of the country to a council of war in Cettinge on Saturday.

PARIS, Oct. 22.
The Gambetta organs are beginning to press the Ministry to enforce the religious decrees once for all. The Cabinet may be overturned if it refuses to go on to the end but it seems disposed to compromise with the religious orders.

VIENNA, Oct. 22.
The Tures have dropped the two conditions objected to by Montenegrins.

ATHENS, Oct. 22.
Greece has money. For several months there has been warlike preparations; but she cannot bear the present strain indefinitely. Forty-five thousand men are under arms.

PARIS, Oct. 22.
Several severe shocks of earthquake were felt at Dijon and in that neighborhood Wednesday.

BERLIN, Oct. 22.
It is believed that the Russian Government contemplates granting amnesty to Catholic priests deprived of their benefices under Falk laws. Count Von Arnim's request for safe conduct to visit Berlin is granted.

CASTELNUOVA, Oct. 22.
The Russian corvette Zencoug has returned with money for Russian squadron and subsidies for Montenegro.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 22.
The British consulate of Pamos Coast and Asia Minor, where disturbances recently occurred has requested the presence of British war vessels.

UNITED STATES.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22.
Signal corps station, Block Island, L. I. reports to chief signal officer as follows: Steam propeller S. W. Scunlyer ran ashore on Grove Point, six p. m., yesterday, on her way from Newport to Block Island. The vessel is a total wreck. No lives lost.

NEW YORK, Oct. 22.
The storm continues and all vessels are warned not to go to sea, as it is raging on the whole Atlantic coast, and at sea.

ENGLISH PRICES.—It will doubtless be interesting to know the prices which the products of this Province would bring in the markets of the old country. A list of prices, as prepared by Mr. Sparrow, is therefore given here: Potatoes, per bush, 2s to 2s. 6d.; turneps per bush, 1s. 8d.; beets per hundred weight, 2s.; carrots, per bush, 1s. to 1s. 3d.; mangolds, per bush, 6d.; wheat, per bush, 6s.; barley, 5s.; oats, 3s. to 3s. 3d.; beans, 5s.; peas, 5s.; oysters, per bush, 3s. to 3s. 6d.—*Cor. to St. John Telegraph.*

The absence of scurvy among the crew of Prof. Nordenskjold's exploring vessel, the Vega, is attributed by him as due to the free use of a little berry which springs from the ice and snow of the Arctic regions. During the summer it is very plentiful, has the flavor of raspberry, and, when dried, is mixed with the milk of the reindeer. The mixture thus obtained can be carried thousands of miles without spoiling.

The Chief Justice of England is paid \$40,000 a year, the Chief Justice of the Common Pleas and the Chief Baron \$35,000 each, and the Master of the Rolls (who has not to go on circuit), \$30,000. The puisne judges are paid \$25,000, out of which they have to pay probably about \$2,500 a year for circuit expenses. Besides this, all the presidents of divisions have extremely valuable patronage.

The Antiquary says the largest oak in England is one in the Parish of Cowthorpe, West Riding of Yorkshire. It is hollow, and forty men could stand within its trunk. It is believed to be about 1500 years old. The boughs extended fifty feet from the trunk a few years ago.

Leigh Hunt was fined \$500 and imprisoned about 1812, for speaking of George, the Prince Regent; as "a fat Adonis of fifty." Hunt was the original of Dickens' "Harold Skimpole."

A MARKED improvement is reported in the British Live Stock market. Both cattle and sheep are in better demand.

The brig "Brenda," Finlayson, to Peake Bros & Co., with cargo of salt, from Liverpool arrived here on the 24th inst.

We regret to learn that George McLeod, Esq., is suffering severely from a cold which settled in his face on Friday.

ONE of "Mother Carey's Chickens" was seen swimming off Pownal Wharf on Saturday evening. It must have been carried in by the gale.

We learn that owing to the Telegraph communication being interrupted west of Campbellton, the order to hoist the storm signal drum did not arrive until Saturday afternoon.

SEVENTY thousand sheep and forty thousand cattle have been shipped to Great Britain from Montreal during the season now nearly closed. Next year the Maritime Provinces will we trust, do more than they have hitherto done in this lucrative trade.

FOUR boys were arrested by the police on Sunday, while enjoying a sociable game of forty-fives in a barn on St. Peter's Road. This morning the Magistrate lectured them sharply, told them that on next offense he would imprison them for vagrancy, and then imposed on each a fine of one dollar and costs.

ACADEMY OF MUSIC.—On Thursday evening Dr. Leeming, lectures on Shakespeare. Mr. Walter Blacklock takes a benefit on Friday evening, appearing in Dedicato Ground, or Paris in 76. Mr. Lindley, has engaged the Constable Hook Co., for a few performances, and pantomime effects are being sent for from New York, for Christmas.

LOST AT SEA.—Edward J. McDonald, eldest son of the late James McDonald, Esq., Kingsboro, Lot 47, mate of the schooner *Mary Jane* accidentally fell overboard on the night of the 19th inst., when near Cape North and was drowned. The deceased was a young man of exemplary character, and his sudden and untimely death is deplored by many friends and acquaintances. We tender our sympathies to his aged mother in this her deep affliction.

A STEAMER FOR ENGLAND.—Enquiries are being made in this city relative to the amount of freight, especially of live cattle, which can be secured for a steamer sailing direct from St. John for England. It is said that a steamer leaving St. John within a month can get at least 300 head of cattle. There are the up-river districts, Sackville, Nova Scotia and P. E. Island to be heard from. The prospect of securing a steamer is brightening.—*St. John Sun.*

A MODEL SON-IN-LAW.—A son-in-law, who is evidently not possessed of that care which others are of their father-in-law's goods and chattles, rashly speculated on his account and in his absence sold at a fair price a cow, a pig, two sheep, together with sundry chattle—all the property of his aforesaid father-in-law. (With the proceeds of the sale he revelled by night, but not by day, for he was arrested in a state of beastly intoxication, with the greater portion of the proceeds on his person. He was arraigned before the Stipendiary Magistrate to-day, when the usual fine was imposed. The proceeds of sale are still in the hands of the police, and will be, no doubt, returned to the father-in-law.)

HORRIBLE TRAGEDY.—A fearful tragedy recently took place at Tizzard's Harbor, Newfoundland, resulting in the death of a man named Pierce Cantwell, at the hands of his brother Nicholas Cantwell. It appears that a fish flake belonging to Cantwell has been for some days past pestered with dogs who destroyed a quantity of fish, and, notwithstanding a vigilant watch for these brutes, they could not be discovered. On the evening mentioned Nicholas Cantwell observed what he thought to be a dog prowling over the flake—it being dark and rainy at the time. He immediately got his gun and fired at it, killing it on the spot, but on approaching the body, imagine the poor fellow's horror when he discovered that he had shot and killed his own brother.

The system of prosecution under which Rev. Dr. Dix, of New York, lately suffered, by which persons continually called upon him in response to advertisements which he was supposed to have inserted in the papers, has been imitated in an English town, where people of all professions and trades were brought together at a certain house. Three doctors came to attend a supposed case of child birth; a carriage and pair came to take the lady to an asylum; two dentists came to extract her teeth; an undertaker was on hand to take her measure for a coffin; and purveyors of baby linen, upholsterers, furniture dealers and others congregated simultaneously at the house in question. No clue has yet been found to the discovery of the hoaxer.
