## Life Underwriters Discuss Two-Year Training Course

The regular monthly meeting of the Life Underwriters Association of Prince Edward Island was held yesterday at the Charlottetown Hotel. The main feature of the meeting was a discussion of the Life Underwriters Training Course, which is a two-year, on-the-job, sales training program designated to sharpen the sales skills and knowledge of life underwriters, and keep them abreast of the changing life insurance marketplace, and is sponsored by the Life Underwriters Association of Canada.

The speakers included Jack Walmley, "Mutual Life of Canada," from Summerside, who gave his impressions of the first year course, which he has recently completed. He pointed out that the course was a "whetstone, well oiled by the years of experience of a competent moderator, with which I was able to sharpen the tools of my trade." He went on to say that he is anxiously looking ahead to the second year course, which begins in October.

Bennett Carr, Sun Life, who discussed the second year course which he completed a few years ago, described how this part of

## Laval Medical Faculty Projects 275 Students

QUEBEC (CP) — Laval University's faculty of medicine has had to refuse 275 qualified applicants this term and Dean Rosalire Gingras predicts that more than 3,000 will be refused admission in the next decade unless more money and badly needed teaching institutions are made available.

Dr. Gingras said in an interview the situation is similar at the University of Montreal, which has the only other French-language faculty of medicine in Canada.

Both Laval and Montreal have been able to handle only about 125 freshmen medicine students a year.

"To admit more would be to put standards of the faculties in jeopardy," Dr. Gingras said. Dr. Gingras said the situation coincides with a growing need for doctors in Quebec, one which may become overwhelming if a universal health insurance plan comes into effect.

## Trade Gaps Widen In U.K.

LONDON (CP) — Britain's worrisome trade gap widened during August as the rate of imports hit a high, adding zest to the election mill and raising new questions about the underlying health of a burgeoning economy.

The Board of Trade's estimated preliminary estimates issued here showed August's seasonally-adjusted exports equivalent to \$1,152,000,000 and imports at a peak of \$1,431,000,000, leaving a deficit of \$279,000,000.

For some months financial critics have hammered on the necessity for Britain to prepare a defensive policy on imports to prevent a possible attack on sterling, but Britain's trade chief, Edward Heath, rejected suggested new import curbs, saying this could bring counter-measures from other countries.

KENSINGTON — The annual Teachers' fall convention for Kensington Local was held in the regional school, Kensington, Wednesday, Sept. 16. George Doughtart, president, chaired the meeting.

The following committees were a m e d: nominations, Ronald Euston, Mrs. Hilary Meek, Gerald Meek; resolutions, Reggie Smith, Bernard Callaghan, and Mrs. Doreen Pickett; questions box, Harold Leard and Sandra Simms; press, Mrs. Hazel MacPhee and Mrs. Margie Bennett.

In the president's address Mr. Doughtart outlined the highlights of the year's work, and commended the teachers very highly in their attempts to advance both professionally and socially.

**TEACHER RELATIONS**

## 77 Teachers Attend Meet

**RAISING PRESTIGE**  
The local program, which was chaired by Kenneth Walker, consisted of a panel discussion on "Raising the Prestige of our Profession." The members of the panel were Mrs. Helen MacCabe, Sister Mary of Carmel, Mrs. Margaret Cousins and Glen Beaton.

Wilson Ross, superintendent of high schools, recommended that "we formulate policies in respect to our high schools so there would be more uniformity."

The resolutions which were read by Reggie Smith, brought a great deal of discussion from the floor.

The nominations committee brought in the following slate of officers: president, Mrs. Anna MacFarlane; vice president, Glen Beaton; secretary, Sister Marie Therese.

**850 A YEAR**  
Canada's 12 medical schools have been turning out about 850 graduates a year for some time now, despite a growing population. In 1961, there was one doctor for every 972 Canadians. In 1960, the ratio was one for 673.

The number of doctors varied widely across the country. In Ontario, the best area — there was one for every 780 residents. In Newfoundland, the ratio was one to 1,616.

Newfoundland, in this respect, was no better off than "underdeveloped country."

In Quebec, the struggle of two provinces to provide doctors for one-third of Canada's are: president, Aubin J. Gallant; vice-president, Sister St. Charles Patrick; secretary Paul Beaton; and treasurer, Mrs. M. J. Beaton.
