DISASTER.—On Tuesday morning Mr. Nathaniel Gay, of Pownall, saw a vessel stranded on the East reef that runs from Governor's Island and observed that there were men clinging to the rigging. He came to town and informed various persons of what he had seen. When Mr. G. T. Hazard, of our office, heard of the perilous condition of the men, he immediately gave information to the Collector of Customs. The Collector, with his usual promptness and energy, lost no time in sending relief to the shipwrecked men. Mr. Wm. Dalt, owner of the tug Henry Atkin, readily consented to attempt to go to the wreck, though the wind blew a gale and the sea ran high. Coal was taken in and other preparations were vigorously made, and in about an hour after word was brought that the men were on the wharf, voluntarily to take the men off. Mr. Currie requested the agent of the Steam Navigation Company, Mr. Hales, to get one of the "steam-tugs" to accompany the Henry Atkin as soon as possible—both the Company's steamers being in the harbor at the time. Some difficulty being made about sending one of the Company's boats, and there being no time to be lost, application was made to Mr. Hazard, the friend of Peake, Bros. & Co., for the loan of one, and that gentleman told the persons who went to him to take the best boat they could get belonging to the firm, and to get off as quick as they could. Five brave fellows, who were on the wharf, volunteered to man the boat. Their names are Patrick Lewis, Thomas Butler, Francis McFarley, John Murphy and James Ledwell. These, with Captain Robertson, of the tug, Wm. B. Frank, Bar, in command, and Mr. N. Gay, left the wharf at about 3 o'clock in the afternoon on their humane, but dangerous, errand.

The wind was W. N. W., and blowing a perfect gale. So rough was it that the boat which the tug had in tow lifted three times before Governor's Island was reached, and the sea made a clean breach over the Henry Atkin. The water poured in at the hatches, and though Capt. Robertson kept the two pumps at work, he was under the necessity of bailing her out to keep her afloat. When the Henry Atkin got as near the wreck as was safe to bring her, the boat was manned with alacrity, and the men pulled to the wreck with a will, and rescued the poor fellows who were lashed to its rigging from their dangerous and unprofitable position. The stranded vessel was the Mary Kate, from Cape Breton, laden with limestone. The names of the crew are Edward Walsh, master, Alex. Hamilton, Patrick Kirwan and George Wood. They were much exhausted, particularly the boys. Once on board the Henry Atkin, however, they soon recovered strength and cheerfulness. The tug arrived at the wharf about seven o'clock, and the Collector of Customs saw that the comfort of the shipwrecked men was the first consideration. The stranded vessel was towed to the wharf, and the men were in praise of the brave men who risked their lives on that wild evening to succor their fellow-creatures in distress, and we trust that they may receive a substantial reward for their gallant conduct.—Patriot.

THE Summerside Journal reports that several vessels were driven ashore by the gale. We have heard of three, viz: Schooner Jessie, Captain Clark—stranded at Schomberg Bay; Iva, owned by Mr. L. B. McKinnon, ashore at Sea Cow Head; and another, the name of which is unknown to us, is ashore a little to the west of Sea Cow Head Light.

PERU seems to be in a rapid decline. We hear from Lima that the banks "Nacional del Peru," "del Peru," "Lima," and "La Franchisa," represented by their managers, have agreed to suspend payment of their obligations, until they are enabled to procure sufficient coined money for their necessities. The Government has sanctioned the proceeding. It may safely be said that the people and government of Peru are not fit to be trusted with paper currency.
