WONDERFUL WALNUT PIE

Any recipe for 8" or 9" pie shell. 1/2 cup brown sugar, packed. 1/2 cup soft butter. 3/4 cup granulated sugar. 3 eggs. 1/2 teaspoon salt. 1/2 cup corn syrup. 1/2 cup light cream. 1 cup broken walnut meats. 1/2 teaspoon vanilla. 7 walnut halves. Heat oven to 350 degrees. Line pie plate with pastry. Trim edge even with pie plate. In double boiler top, cream brown sugar and butter, stir in granulated sugar, eggs, salt, corn syrup and cream. Cook over hot water (not boiling) five minutes, stirring constantly. Remove from heat, stir in broken nuts and vanilla. Pour into lined pie plate. Bake at 350 degrees for 50 minutes. Arrange walnut halves on top and bake 15 minutes longer. Cool on a wire rack. The pie is delicious as is, but if desired, top each wedge with ice cream or whipped cream.

How Can I?

Contract Bridge

"WEAK" OPPOSITION There are many occasions on which it is far better to be opposed by an expert than an amateur—East learned, to his disgust, in the following hand.

After West passed originally East felt that slim chances were remote, so in an effort to buy the contract at game (or punish an unwary opponent for competing rashly) East made his unorthodox preemptive bid. It was East's bad luck that the player at his left was not an expert and lacked the expert's fear of being "slaughtered." South had no fear; he promptly overcalled with four spades! What this could have cost is beyond reckoning, but South had something in this deal at least that is a very fine substitute for skill—remarkable good luck. North had virtually the perfect dummy for South, and the latter brought home the doubled contract by making a good guess about the jack of diamonds in the final stages of play. It is true (also) that West's double of four spades was not fully justified, but from West's point of view no other action was more attractive. Certainly West couldn't afford to bid five clubs, and if he passed, it was not likely that East would mention the club suit. The damage was done, really, when East preempted; had he started with one heart, South would have overcalled with one spade, and then (having passed originally) West might well have elected to mention his clubs. If he did, East could certainly persist to at least five clubs.

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That Body of Yours PRINCIPLES OF TREATMENT OF CANCER

We must admit in the first place that up to now we do not know what causes the body cells to take on the characteristics of cancer nor do we know how to prevent this happening. However, we do know that the malignant (cancer) cells can be removed or destroyed, we will obtain cures which will allow our patients to live in comfort through a normal life span. Before mentioning treatment, let us see how cancer spreads. It spreads in three ways: (1) by spreading through tissue space, that is, by the cancer cells multiply at a fantastic rate of speed, and so encroaching on other organs and so destroying them, (2) by way of the lymph nodes, and (3) by the blood stream to distant organs. Now how can we remove or destroy these malignant cells? Let us look first at surgery. The surgical treatment of cancer, aiming at a cure, requires the removal of the primary growth (the cancer itself) and of the lymphatic field around it to prevent its return. This should be done by surgeons of great experience and training and it is wrong for the surgeon who operates occasionally to tackle such an intricate procedure. For instance in cancer of the breast it may be necessary to remove not only the breast itself but also the whole path of the lymph stream out to the armpit. More recently, we have the radiological treatment of cancer, that is treatment by radium or X-ray. Its object is not the removal of the cancerous growth but the destruction of it and its scattered cells wherever they may be. This is possible because cancer cells are more sensitive to the rays than are normal cells. It is the constant effort, therefore, of the radiologist to develop rays of sufficient strength and penetrating power to reach all the cancer cells and destroy them without injury to the surrounding tissues. The radiologist has been most successful in the treatment of surface cancers such as those of the skin, the lip, the tongue, the larynx and the uterus. Nowadays these cancers are usually treated by X-ray or radium and not by surgery. What about those poor unfortunate whose cancer has already advanced too far for it to be removed or destroyed? There is still something to be done to lengthen life and make it more comfortable. For instance the removal of a growth in the stomach (gastroectomy) may make it possible for the patient to survive a year and sometimes several years before the cancer becomes evident in other parts of the body. Similarly deep X-ray therapy may give relief to pain in cancer of the spine.

HER SPECIFIC JOB

Alec probably regards you now as a jailer who is trying to keep him from all fun, but in his baby he'll see a very good reason why he must settle down and begin to provide. Your specific job at the moment is to make marriage as attractive to him as possible. Be sure Alec has a share in creating a real home out of whatever surroundings you find, and let it dawn on him that marriage is a partnership.
