



OPENS EXHIBITION

A. Lorne MacKay Addresses Rotary

"To be a citizen of Canada means that we are possessed of and by a deep and abiding love for our country as a whole," according to A. Lorne MacKay, BA, DD, who spoke to the regular luncheon meeting of the Charlottetown Rotary Club at the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday.

Dr. MacKay, who was born at Margate, P.E.I., and is currently the minister of Central Presbyterian Church, Hamilton, Ont., and president of that city's Canadian Club, chose as his subject "Being a Citizen of Canada."

"The theme of citizenship is one which calls for deep thought and serious consideration in our day," said Dr. MacKay. "We are rapidly approaching the One Hundredth anniversary of Canada's existence as a nation and one would normally expect that the anticipation of this important milestone in our nation's life would draw all Canadians closer together in common happiness and shared pride."

Dr. MacKay said that a sobering and disturbing fact that seldom if ever has our nation seemed more divided than at the present time. The concept of "separatism" — whether it be the firmly held creed of a small but vocal minority or a deliberate and unworthy device used to gain a desired advantage — is a disturbing and even frightening fact in contemporary Canadian life. The speaker continued that it should be noted that this concept has been publicized, repudiated and scored by responsible political leaders in recent days.

Nevertheless, the concept remains as a real danger to Canadian unity, and must not be taken too lightly. The continuing power struggle between provincial rights and federal authority, the tendency to stress sectional interests without a thought for the good of the whole, the troubled dialogue on the subject of financial autonomy, and the disruptive tendencies which in some form or another are always present, all add to the ever-present danger of disunity and are potentially dangerous enemies to Canadian unity and Canadian greatness.

Dr. MacKay said "Loyalty to the Crown can be the greatest single unifying factor in our Canadian life. The Queen is the unimpeachable figure of all that is good in government and the Crown is a symbol standing above differences in creed or party. I may differ with my neighbor in political allegiance, I may differ very radically with him in terms of religious belief, but in our common loyalty to the Queen I can stand beside him in perfect harmony as a fellow Canadian. When St. Augustine described a nation as an association of reasonable beings bound together by common agreement as to the objects they might very well have been describing the unique unifying influence of the Crown, the person of the Queen, the spirit of the body politic. Loyalty to the Queen is a prime necessity of genuine Canadian citizenship and I for one will never consent to any tampering with that loyalty. I trust the day will never come when Canadians fail to experience a deep inner emotion when they join voices in the words "God Save the Queen."

The speaker continued "We live in a glorious land and it might be said to us as was spoken long ago: 'Thou shalt bless the Lord for the good land which he hath given thee.' The real reason of this fact should make us conscious of our privileges and responsibilities as citizens of Canada. Citizenship is not to be taken for granted. Citizenship needs, at periodic intervals, if it isn't to lose its significance. There are many things which will enter into such dedication which I have not dealt with here but high on the list there must be the spirit of deep and abiding love for our country as a whole. She added "I would be pleased to convey my particular appreciation to Fulton Robinson, the blacksmith and to the Leavitt Industries and all those who conceived the idea of making this historic presentation."

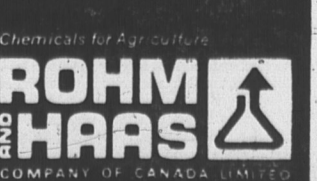

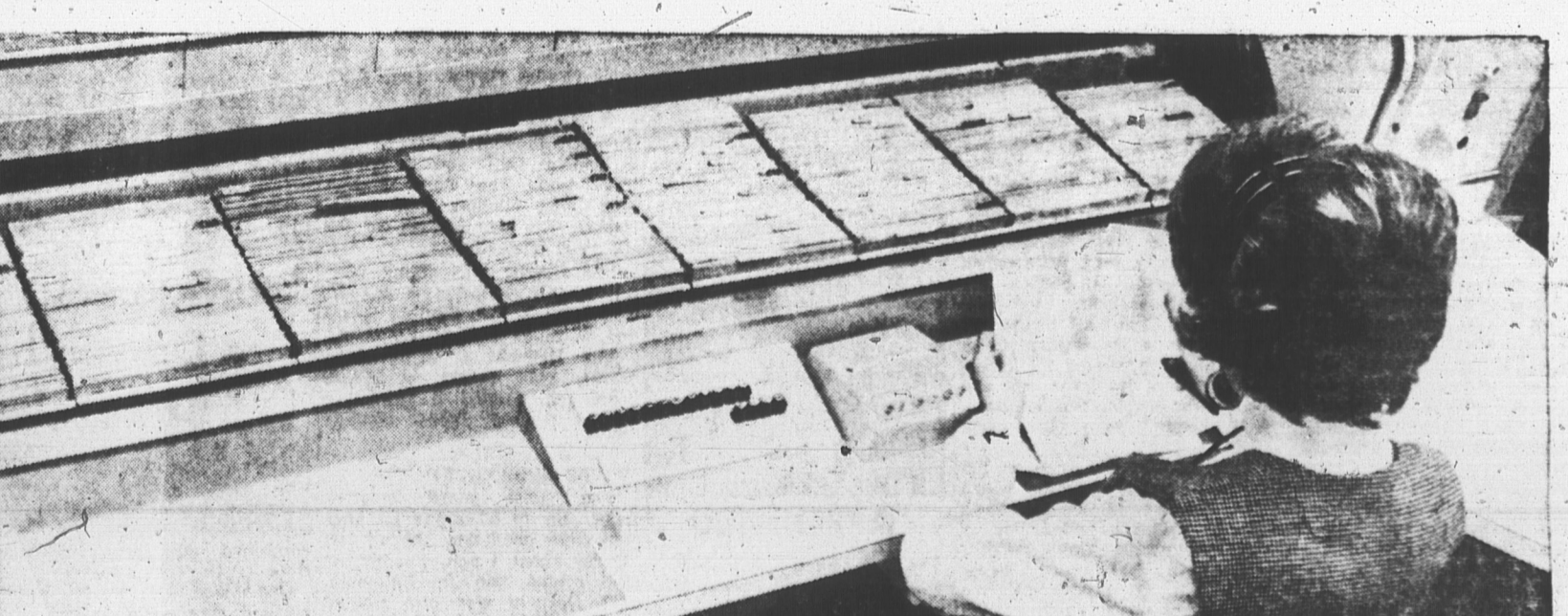
